Residents want Hard surface Sixth Line

Over 40 residents on the Sixth Line, living between 17 and 22 Sideroads, want Halton Hills to improve the road and change its name to Fountain Green.

Speaking on behalf of the homeowners, Robert Heed told Halton Hills works committee Monday night, residents are concerned about the volume of traffic on the road, dust problems and speeding on the Sixth Line.

He asked if the town had ever considered using speed bumps on the road to slow people down. Heed suggested the bumps be placed a few hundred yards back from each intersection to slow drivers down. He noted the bumps wouldn't cause damage but a driver would know he had hit one and slow down.

Heed said residents don't want the road reconstructed with ditches, asphalt or other extensive changes but simply hard topped with maybe tar and chip. He said asphaltting the road would simply lead to more traffic and speeding.

Heed added the residents don't want an oil base put on

the road either because children play on it.

Mayor Tom Hill noted an oil base and sealer is used on a number of the roads the residents said they would like theirs to look like.

Heed said in an effort to preserve local color the name Fountain Green Road was chosen. He said the designation Sixth Line isn't good enough since it confuses visitors and makes it hard for people to find the road.

Committee chairman Mike Armstrong said the silent policemen or speed bumps have never been viewed favorably by the town because they present problems for snow plowing operations.

Councillor Ern Hyde

agreed the speed bumps would be a bad idea.

Engineer Robert Austin said the town could pass a by-law making the Sixth Line a class B road and limiting traffic to vehicles 11 tons maximum. He noted that couldn't be done if the road was improved and to make it a class A road, provincial approval would be needed.

Heed said the present 35 miles per hour speed limit is satisfactory but must be enforced.

The engineer was asked by the committee to prepare a report dealing with the residents' requests.

The Blind Persons' Rights Act becomes law on July 1, 1976.

Here's what the new law says and how Ontario residents can help.

This new Act provides that a blind person accompanied by a dog guide has the same rights, privileges and obligations—with respect to public places—as anyone else. He or she cannot be discriminated against or denied any accommodation, services or facilities available in any place to which the public is customarily admitted.

It is important that dog guide owners know their rights under the Act and that the public, especially employers and their employees, be made aware of the provisions of the Act and their responsibilities under it.

The Attorney General of Ontario will issue identification cards to dog guide owners. The card will carry a photograph of the owner and dog, as well as their names, and will also carry a summary of the main features of the Act.

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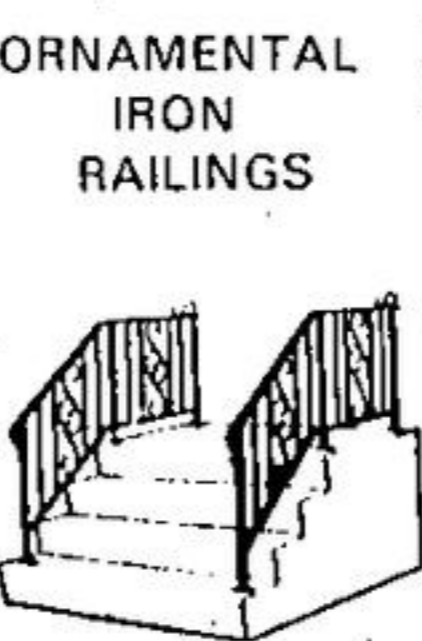
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
