Mr. Hamilton on behalf of the Trustees is proposing that instead of having a variety of

surfaces throughout the village that one type of surface be utilized bringing all roads up to the same standard.  
If this is not acceptable perhaps there could be some sort of "trade" worked out that would improve the most needy streets and reduce the cover on unused roads such as Valley Road.  
The proposals are presently under consideration with Armbrro and a meeting is planned for this week.

Experience '76 is again operating this year in the Grand River Conservation Authority. This year, the G.R.C.A. has been funded a total of \$135,000 (100 per cent provincial grant) as administered through the Ontario Youth Secretariat and operated by the Conservation

Authorities Branch, Ministry of Natural Resources.  
Under this program, the conservation authority is hiring 91 students, involving them in all aspects of G.R.C.A. work.  
Doon Pioneer Village has placed the largest single group of students.

## Zones need change

If an Ontario Municipal Board hearing is required, it could take a minimum of three months before the Everton Inn owners get the go-ahead to renovate the building into a restaurant.

At present, the land is zoned agricultural. Russ Powadiuk, one of the owners, approached the Eramosa township council several months ago requesting the zone be changed to commercial.

A public hearing was held earlier this month for abutting land owners. A handful of people turned out, none with objections to the zone change or to a restaurant at the site. A joint meeting with the council and the Eramosa planning board a few nights later saw closer steps taken. The planning consultant, according to township clerk Lloyd Hindley, is drawing up amendments to the zoning law.  
If any objections are raised, an OMB hearing will be needed, the clerk said.
