No glass tops now for old canning jars

Don't waste your time tached are available to fit searching stores for glass lids these jars. Carefully check to fit old canning jars, the package label when because they are no longer searching for these lids since being manufactured, say food they look very similar to specialists at the Ontario Food Council, Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

If you have Crown, Corona or Jewel jars, treat the glass lids with care to preserve them from getting cracked, nicked or chipped. Once there is damage to the lids, they can no longer be relied on for a perfect seal in the jars. Since there are no replacement lids available, there is no other way to ensure a vacuum, and thus the jars are no longer suitable for can-


