

Monarchs sustain to snap losing streak

Gibson Construction Monarch midget team came up with one of its strongest games of the season and defeated Guelph 11-8 here last Wednesday.

The win snapped a three game losing streak by the Monarchs which started against Six Nations (22-5) and continued at Kincairdine (9-5) and at Woodstock (11-7).

Sporting new blue and gold uniforms, Monarch sustained attacks into the third period against the Royal City crew, which had previously defeated Acton twice.

Pace Both clubs scored six goals by the end of the second period. Monarchs kept up the pace with five goals in the third.

Pete Luty and Bruce McPhail advanced Acton's scoring with a hatrick each on Guelph. They were trailed by Todd McIntyre and Larry Kurtz with a pair each and Shane Withers with a single. Luty, McPhail, Withers and Mike Rippon also collected two assists each and Kurtz three.

Monarch managed to keep within two goals of the Six Nations' squad, in the first frame. However, the visitors dominated the second period with six goals, and the third with 11.

Dave McGilloway, Rick Gibson, Withers, McIntyre and Kurtz were the Acton marksmen.

The night following the Six Nations game (June 23), the Monarchs travelled to Kincairdine. Monarchs outscored their hosts 4-3 in the final period, but it was too little because Kincairdine started earlier to hit the mark.

Pete Hurdle, Withers, McPhail, McIntyre and Rippon each banged one in for the Monarchs.

Against Woodstock last Thursday Monarchs outplayed their hosts in most respects except on the score-board.

Kurtz led Monarchs with three goals, while McPhail, Withers, McIntyre and Gibson added singles. Final score 11-7.

Monarchs play here tonight, and tomorrow travel to London for another match.

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Air safety top priority

Air safety comes first and bilingualism comes second as far as Halton MP Frank Philbrook is concerned.

He said in an interview this week he was pleased to see the planes flying again after a strike by pilots protesting Ottawa's plan to use both French and English for air

traffic control in the Montreal area.

"My stand today is the same as it has been ever since last summer when I first started talking to pilots in Halton about the bilingual question. Air safety has to come first and bilingualism and everything else must come second. I support the government's bilingual policy," Dr. Philbrook declared.

He said Ottawa is trying to take measures to appease both the English pilots and French air traffic controllers and is confident some solution will be reached which will

provide air safety and still allow bilingual air traffic control in the Montreal area.

"The issues have become totally obscured by an emotional confrontation and the government has found it can't resolve it so an independent commission will have to be the answer," he explained.

He said he hopes both sides calm down and let the commission do its work.

"We certainly haven't heard the last of this. It goes to the roots and basis of the country with its two cultures," Dr. Philbrook concluded.
