The toddler was rushed to Georgetown hospital by his father, and later transferred by ambulance to Sick Children's Hospital, Toronto, but died two hours later.

Let contract

Contracts for resurfacing the second line of Erin Township have been given for two types of road paving. Cox Construction will lay asphalt from Highway 24 at Ospringe to 17 Sideroad. The remainder, from 17 to 27 Sideroad, will be a double seal-coat laid by MSO Construction.

The prime coat is already down, of tar covered with sand. This will be followed with two coats of tar and chips. This type of surfacing is less expensive than asphalt, but just as effective.

Erin Township council received word that government funds will be available to bring this Development road up to standard.

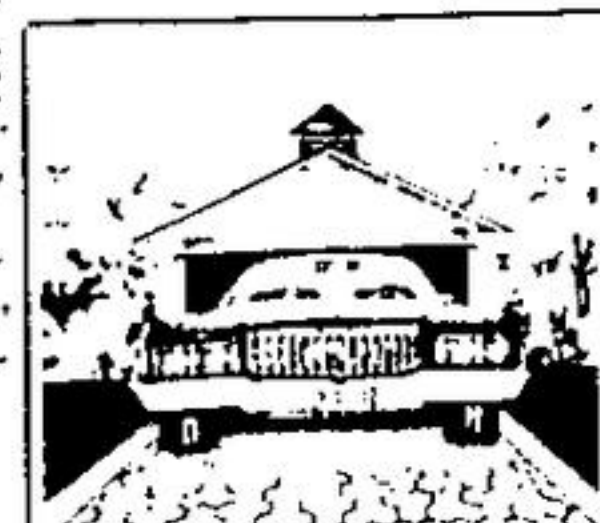
