

Contracts for resurfacing the second line of Erin Township have been given for two types of road paving. Cox Construction will lay asphalt from Highway 24 at Ospringe to 17 Sideroad. The remainder, from 17 to 27 Sideroad, will be a double seal-coat laid by MSO Construction.
