\$5,839 in Wintario grant money comes to the Halton Hills public libraries for the microfilming of newspapers and the purchase of audiovisual equipment.

Grant applications submitted by the library in the spring were approved in a letter received Monday, Aug. 9 from the Minister of Culture and Recreation, Robert Wel-

\$1,144 in grant money will be matched by library funds for the purchase of a new 16 mm projector, record cabinets, filmstrip projector, paperback book racks and projector cabinet.

The remaing \$4,695 will be used to microfilm the back files of the Acton Free Press and the Georgetown Herald, thus preserving an essential resource in both towns' histories. The reels of the Acton Free Press microfilm will be available for use at the Acton Library and those of the Herald will be held at the Georgetown Library.


