## New Zamboni for arenas

A move by Facility Superintendent Pat Sheehan to buy a used Zamboni ice resurfacing machine for \$2,000 could save the \$20,000 cost of a new machine next year.

Halton Hills administration committee, Monday night agreed, and recommended the purchase to council.

The Zamboni including two blades, to be bought from North York, is ten years "younger" than the one now in use at Acton arena, according to Sheehan.

Parker will join 58 other skaters from Eastern Ontario in a session at the University of Western Ontario, Aug. 30 to Sept. 4. Among his fellow students will be Ron Shaver of Galt and Stan Bohonek of Toronto, two Olympic competitors in Innsbruck, Austria this year. Shaver and Bohonek finished second and third in the men's senior championships last winter, behind Toller Cranston of Toronto.

Parker was invited on the basis of his first place finish in the Canadian Novice championships.

## Police insurance

Halton Police Commission wants to take a close look at its car insurance policy after Commissioner Harry Barrett said Thursday the force has a \$10,000 deductible clause every time a cruiser is smashed up.

Commission chairman Glenn Magnuson, Georgetown, said he found that unbelievable and suggested the deductible clause was more likely only \$1,000.

"We pay all costs of damages. That is ridiculous. What car is worth \$10,000?" Chief Ken Skerrett said.

Deputy Chief Fred Oliver said he has discussed the subject with Barrett and differed with the Oakville mayor's opinion. He said he thinks the force has a \$1,000 deductible clause in its insurance.

Barrett explained his interpretation of the insurance clause is that if the force had three cars in a garage and there was a fire and damage amounted to \$15,000 then the
