Ball tourney huge success

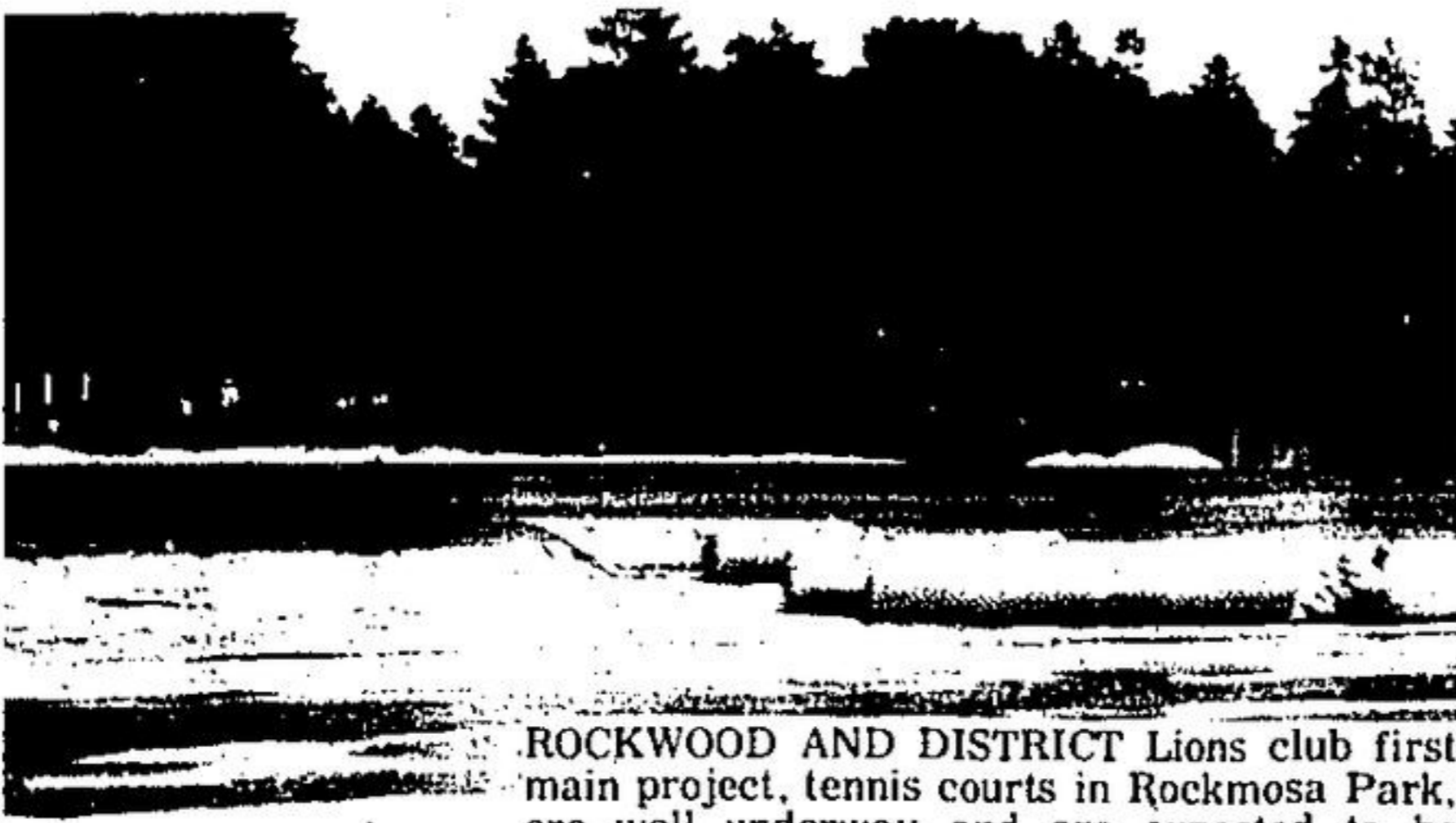

Howard's 8,500 mile cross continent report

A motor trip of 8,500 miles was completed by Mr. and Mrs. H.R. Howard when they returned from a two month holiday through U.S.A. and Canada. Some of the journey was repeat territory for them, with new ground starting in the Ozarks of Arkansas. Mr. Howard says the economic recovery in Oklahoma from the thirties is now noticeable. However, the desert areas of upper Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California, seemed timeless, like a picture painted centuries ago.

Of all desert peoples, the Navajo nation is surviving the best, and is prosperous. They spent a week in the Grand Canyon and Lake Mead area, where on one day the temperature hit 120 degrees F. at Hoover Dam. 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Five out, five in

Last escapee is recaptured

All five men who have escaped from Maplehurst Correctional Centre in Milton in the past five months have been captured and returned to custody, as of Friday.

Hamilton Police arrested 17-year-old Colin Smith, originally from Hamilton, who escaped from the Milton centre's grounds June 23 while on a groundskeeping work party. He was charged with escaping from lawful custody and will be arraigned for a court hearing this week.

Smith, who was described as dangerous, had eight weeks of freedom before being recaptured. He and Robert McGee, 17, of Richmond Hill left the institution and fled to the escarpment area west of urban Milton, but McGee was recaptured in three hours following an intensive chase.

A week earlier, Robert Harvey, 17, of Montreal broke loose as two correctional officers took him to a den-

ist's office in downtown Milton. During his daring escape he waded a stream and swam across the mill pond. He later stole a car at Star Steel, broke into a home on Main St. E. and fled to Montreal, where he was later arrested.

The first to escape was Barry Barnes, 17, of Barrie. He climbed through a hole in a classroom ceiling at Maplehurst in March and fled through snow-covered fields, to four weeks of freedom before being captured.

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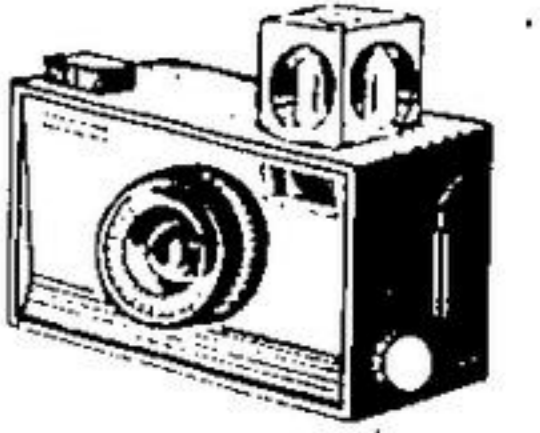
