"But-but-but I earned the bread," protested the Little Red Rooster.

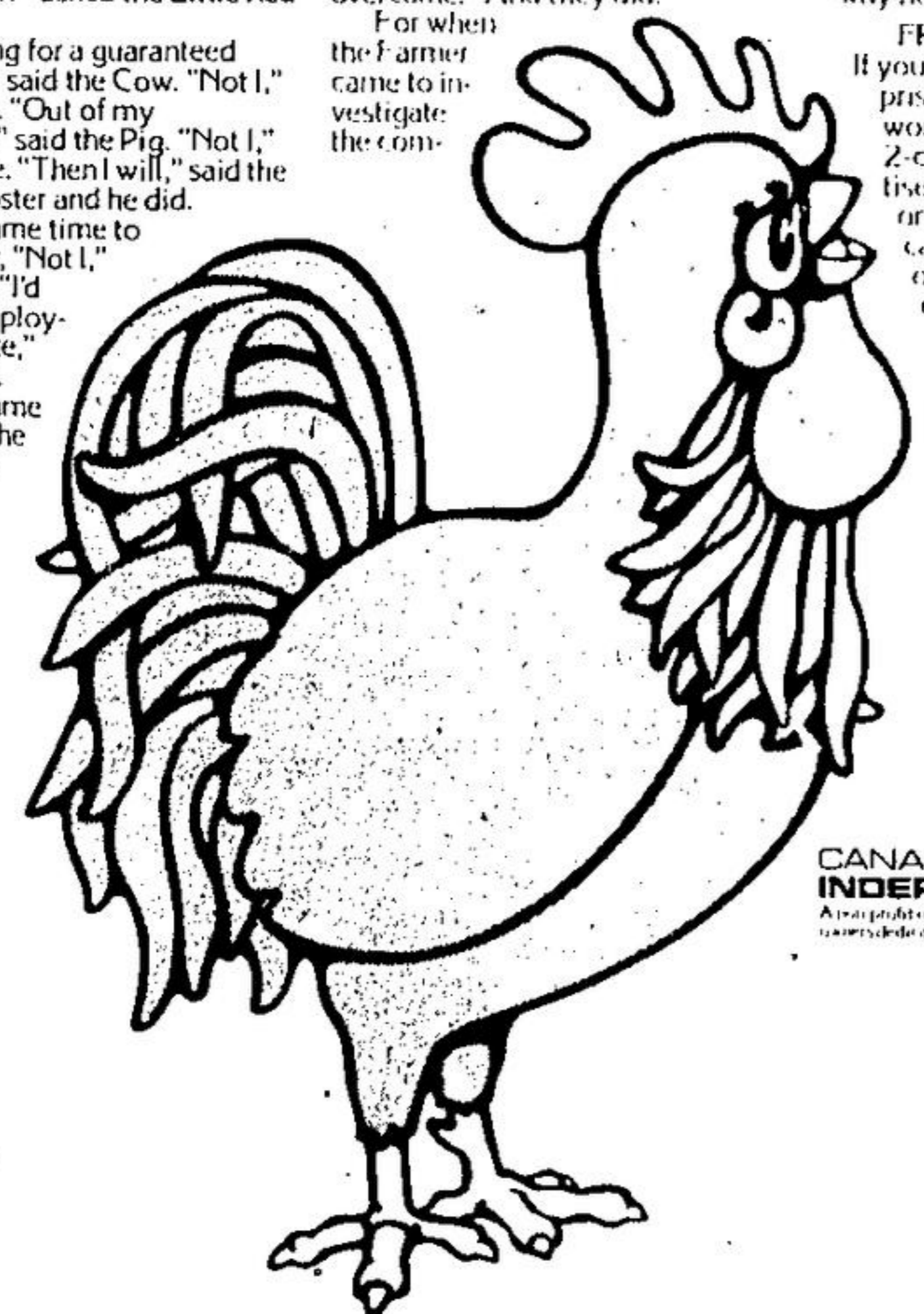
