## Council urges action on grants by Friday

Eramosa township council last night (Tuesday) noted the deadline for Local Initiative Program grants is this Friday, September 10.

They emphasized anyone interested in such grants should apply before this date for such grants or they will be ineligible until the fall of 1977.

Anyone may apply for the grant, including municipalities, groups of people, organizations, or individual persons. If a grant is received, employees must be on un-

employment insurance, welfare, or in between the two, and actively looking for employment through a Canada Manpower office.

Programs should not compete with any existing jobs, nor should salaries offered.

Projects undertaken with an LIP grant must start by November 1, 1976 and end no later than July 2, 1977, and January 1, 1977, and end by July 2, 1977.

## Lower Kelso lake

Halton Region Conservation Authority has advised all users of the Kelso Conservation Area that beginning Tuesday (Sept. 7), the Authority began lowering the water level in the reservoir to undertake necessary maintenance work on the dam.

"We anticipate that the draw down process will take

approximately two weeks to complete, and that refilling of the reservoir will commence by the end of September," said HRCA General Manager Murray Stephen.

"Due to the low water levels during September, we regret that the reservoir will not be available for boating and other forms of water recreation," he said.

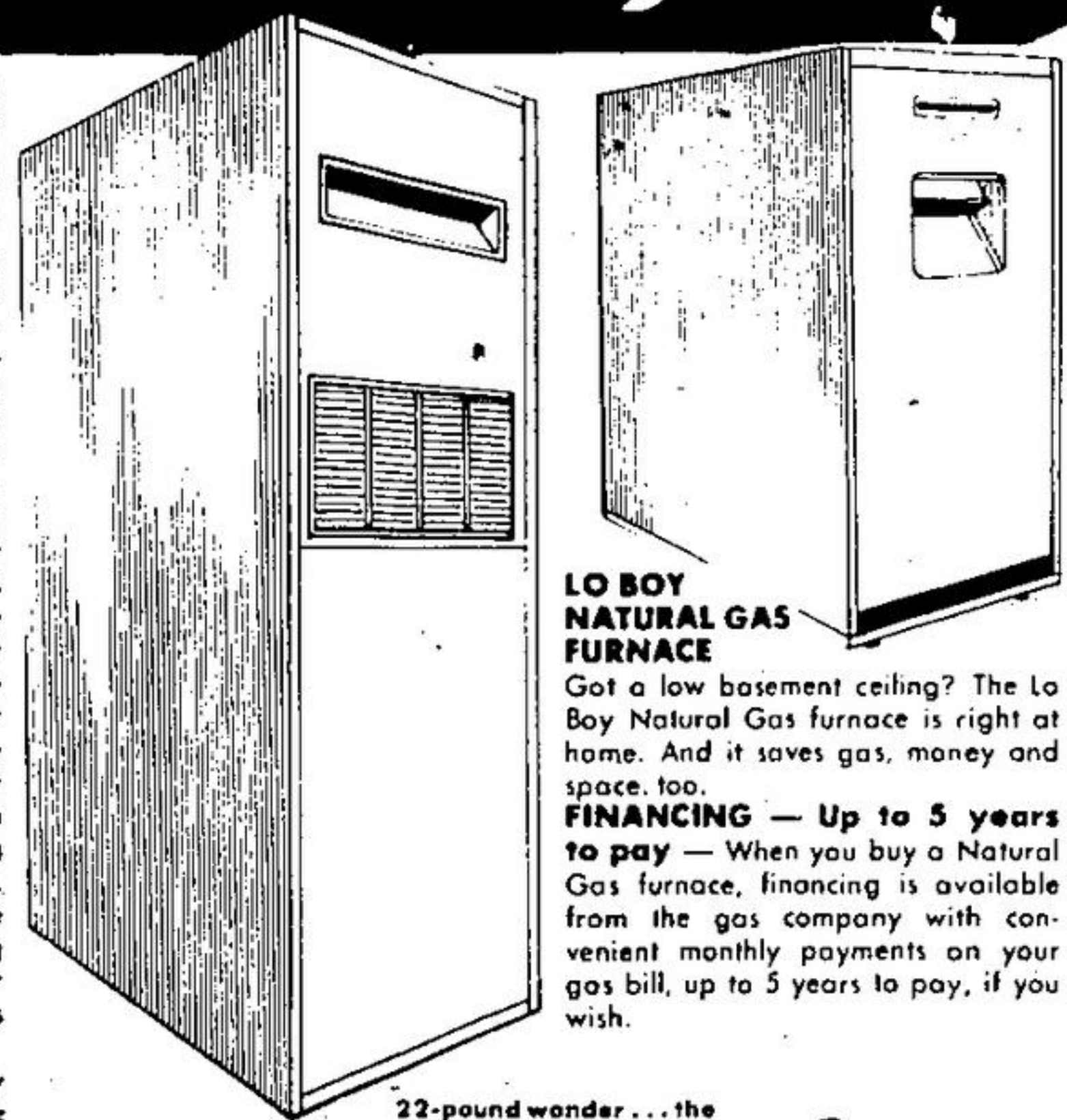

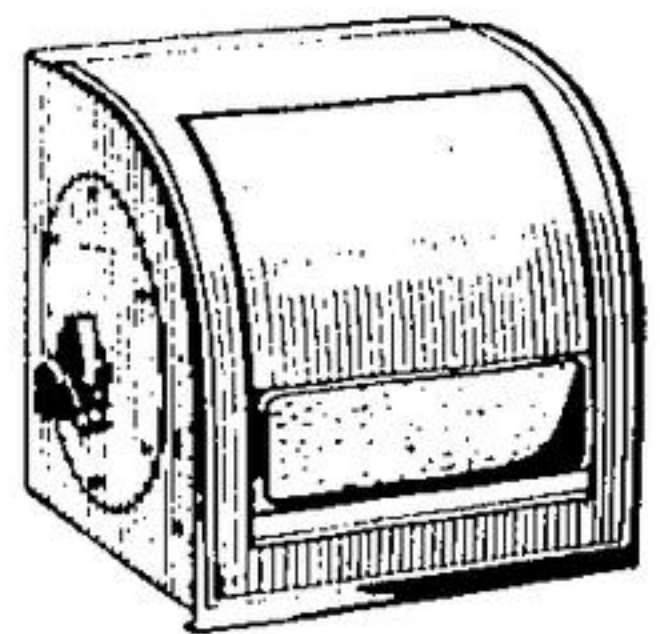

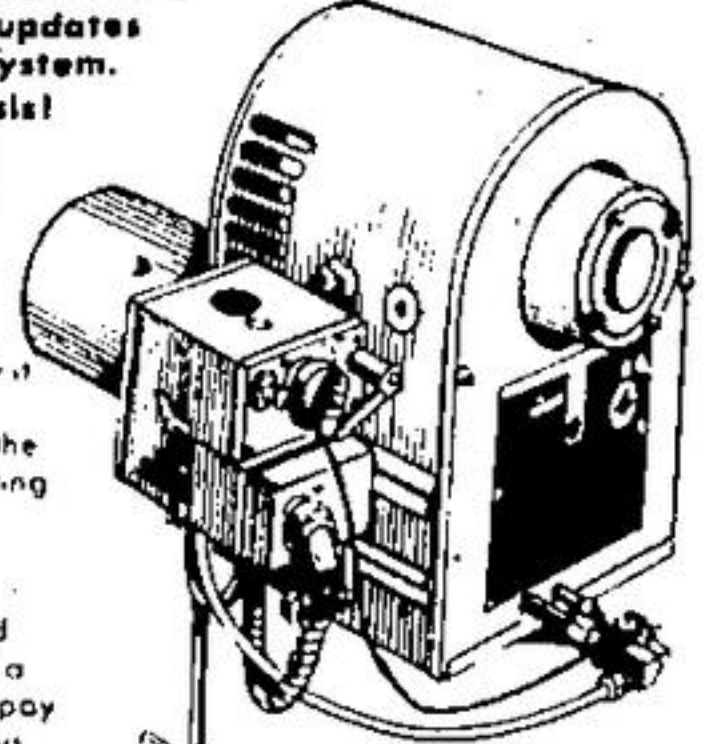
