Arena future brightens up

Jack Johnson, MPP, Wellington-Dufferin-Peel, was happy to know that the special grant program of paying up to 75 per cent for all arenas which have been subject to safety inspections, will help to minimize disruption in the sports and recreational life of the communities affected.

"In Wellington-Dufferin-Peel it won't be easy," Mr. Johnson states. "The arenas at Inglewood, Shelburne, Drayton, Arthur, Fergus, Elora, Hillsburgh and Erin are being torn down or repaired. New facilities are to be constructed to prevent any possible accidents to the users of these facilities. Safety remains a prime concern as I have publicly stated before. It's better to be safe than sorry."

He was pleased that a pledge by any civic minded organization to raise their share of money over the next three years, will constitute sufficient proof of widespread community support and will permit Wintario to provide funds. Normally groups have to raise their share before receiving Wintario money. Not only that but such financial help will prevent the arena problem from affecting local tax rates.

The other source of major funding is provincial grants provided through the Community Recreation Centres Act. "All our arenas will be funded through these sources and will receive special consideration equal to repair

costs plus the regular Wintario arrangement for the balance," he observed.

"I know that Elora's application has been approved and that the other applications are in the process of receiving approval. I would hope that construction of the other arenas would be under way very shortly," Mr. Johnson commented. Any community which has already applied will be subject to review and adjustment.

The staff of the Ministry of Culture and Recreation are to seek speedy approval for those communities affected by the closings.

Wintario could aid arena

The Ontario government is increasing its grants from the Wintario program to 75 percent, to aid in repairing or rebuilding the defective arenas. Erin Township council received a letter saying Wintario would match private donations, so if the Hillsburgh Community Centre pays \$50,000, and council raises \$50,000, Wintario would pay the difference of \$100,000. Wheelwright of Weston has the contract for building the arena.

Mrs. Jack Graham inquired of council at Wednesday night's meeting about selling the Farm Equipment shop and gas pumps in the village, saying they had a client interested in this type of business. As it is non-conforming, a commercial business in a residential zone, she was informed if the proposed buyer continues in the same business and carries on the same type of work they are all within their rights.

A provincial certificate of approval was received concerning the township waste disposal site.

Foul odour
Mr. and Mrs. Johnston who reside on part of the west half of lot 5, con. 3, brought before council their concern about the foul odour of pig manure around that area, which is especially strong under certain weather conditions. They made it clear they did not expect to not have some odours, living in a farm area, and they did not want to create hostility, but they were asking for limitations in a boundless pollution problem. This manure is spread on the fields surrounding their house, and let lie indefinitely without being turned under, but their main concern was

the open lagoon which is about 400 feet from their residence. The by-law says an open lagoon has to be 200 feet from the road and 700 feet from an existing residence, but as this hog operator has been there for six years, he was in operation before the by-law was passed.

Council was unable to help in the matter, but suggested Mr. Johnston take the problem to the Environmental people, as they would be the only ones that could help.

Subdivision
Howard Simmons, a lawyer living on the 7th line, brought plans for approval of the 20 lot Garden Court subdivision on the Edgar Armstrong property on the 9th line. Council suggested first having the county planner, Rodger Truemmer, look at the plan of the subdivision.

It was moved by Ormisher and Marshall that the following accounts be paid for sheep killed by suspicion of wolves: Catherine Dillon, one lamb, \$25, Don Sanderson, one lamb, \$25, Smith Griffin, one registered ewe, \$75, and one registered lamb \$50.

In the equalized assessment for school purposes the percentage of representation on the board is 12.5 for one member. Erin Township and Erin Village are grouped together for a total assessment of \$57,882, 859, which is a 16.75 percentage. When it reaches 5 percent of a difference they would be entitled to two members.

Ed Barden, road superintendent, reported to council there was \$2,000 damage from a recent storm, to the shoulders of the newly-constructed road on the 2nd line.
