

May still register for fall Y courses

Registrations were received at the Y Saturday for the fall programs, and board spokesman Alec Johnson says registrations will be accepted for the rest of this week. Quite a few signed up for the courses but every group can take more, he says. He was particularly disappointed in the low registration for defensive driving. This classroom course would be instructed by Cons. Tom Roduck, who has taken special training in giving the course. There would be four sessions.

Several programs are especially planned for mothers with young children in mind.

At fair The Y will have a booth at the fair this weekend where registration forms will be available and accepted. The yoga class is another popular "repeat".

Mothers For mothers with young children there are several special possibilities. There's Ladies' Keep Fit and the pre-School Gym for children. The Ladies' Take a Break will feature special programs Wednesday mornings. Kiddies Klub Friday mornings lets the mothers drop off the children and then pick them up three hours later.

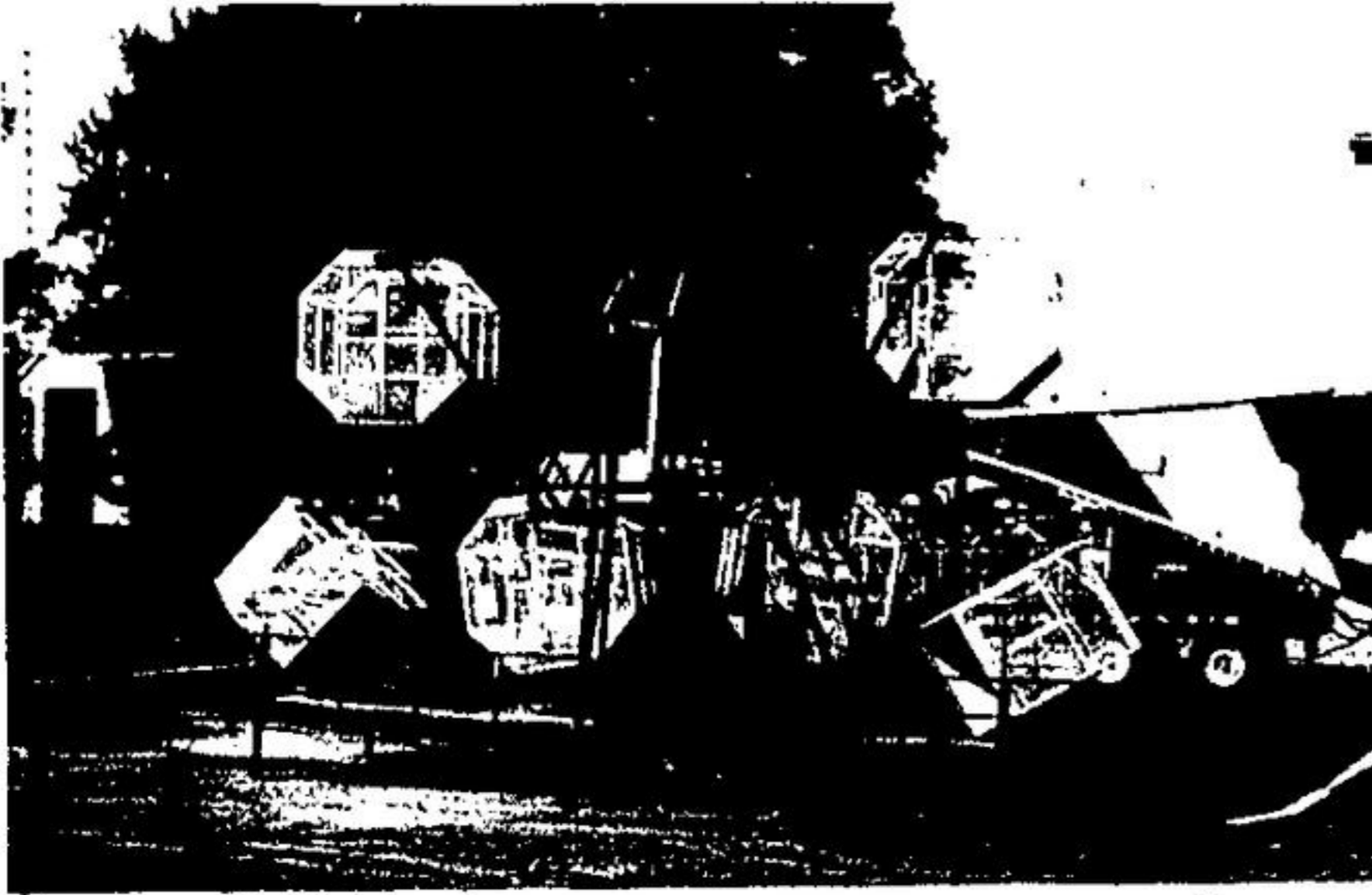
The supporters of the Theatre Y program are very anxious to have more people enrolled than there were last year.

Night school teachers announced for courses

Registration for night school will be held at the Acton High School to-night (Wednesday) for some 19 classes.

Displays will be set up in the auxiliary cafeteria to show new students what they will be doing during their course, and some teachers will be on hand according to organizer Boris Shean.

All courses but Metrication begin the week of October 4, and all courses but Yoga will be held at the high school. Metrication will begin on October 12, and Yoga will be held at Robert Little school.

Teachers Bookkeeping for Small Business will be a three hour course running every Wednesday for ten weeks. Ian McGilivray will be the instructor.

Bill Coats will be teaching Bridge for two hours every Wednesday evening for ten weeks. Mrs. M. Nellis will be in charge of Cake Decorating on Wednesdays for three hours a lesson, with a ten week course.

Mrs. Eleanor McCulloch will have her Wednesday evenings filled up for ten weeks teaching two hours a week of crocheting. Blair Beemer will be instructing an eight week course in St. John Ambulance first aid for two hours on Tuesdays.

Fitness and Recreation will run for two hours a week for ten weeks on Monday evenings. Bruce Andrews will be in charge of that course.

Conversational French, under the leadership of Mrs. Bibiane Beranek, will be taught Monday evenings for three hours a night, running for ten weeks. Wednesday

evenings Clarence Rognavaldson will be assigned to teaching General Shopwork for ten weeks, three hours a week.

Mrs. Peggy Hannah will for 18 weeks be teaching three hours of knitting I on Monday evenings. For the same length of time, but on Wednesday evenings, she will also instruct Sewing I (for beginners).

Mrs. Sarah Hamilton will also be teaching two courses. On Tuesday evenings for ten weeks she will be instructing two hours of Macrame, and on Mondays, for the same amount of time, Weaving, Small Loom will be her subject.

Metrication will be Tuesday nights for two hours for three weeks. An instructor has not yet been named.

Residential Landscaping and Maintenance will be held for two hours, for ten weeks on Tuesdays. Monday evenings for Jim Goring will be occupied with his teaching Sketching for ten weeks, two hours a lesson.

Mrs. Joan Kroll is another with two classes to teach Typing I, for beginners will be on Monday evenings for 20 weeks, two hours a lesson. Typing 2, brush up, will be Wednesdays for ten weeks, two hours a class.

Mrs. Melanija Bray will be at Robert Little with her two Yoga classes. Yoga I for beginners is Wednesday evenings, ten weeks, two hours a week. Yoga 2 will be Thursday evening for the more advanced. It also will be ten weeks, two hours a week.

There are two changes in the courses from previously advertised. The St. John Ambulance First Aid course

originally scheduled for Monday evening will be Tuesday. Conversational French was advertised for 15 weeks at two hours a week and has been changed to ten weeks, three hours a session. The ad in today's paper is correct.
