## Board opinion of competition

Education has asked the report to be short and simply -administration to prepare a -answer the question with position paper on the board's view of competition

Trustee Richard Goodin said there has been a trend in education in recent years for schools to downplay competition while competition is important in the real world.

"There are many examples especially in the outside world, including the recent world-wide Olympic games, where competition, standards, objectives, and emotional response are of major importance." Goodin declared.

Goodin suggested there is a conflict in goals between the school and outside world and urged the administration to table a position paper, "in order that parents and public may definitely know where we are at, and the direction we are taking."

"I want us to simply declare our position on competition. For or against, encourage or discourage, Goodin said.

Trustee Tony Goodyear praised Goodin's idea and said he thought the majority of Halton residents are in favor of competition and so it should be reflected in the school system.

Goodin said he wanted the some supporting reasons.

He went on to say emotional response should be included in the report because emotional response to competition is very im-

"If we downgrade emotional response we will lose, something. That is what life is about and it's wonderful," Goodin declared.

Trustee Fred Armitage said the report would give the administration and trustees the chance to discuss com-




