## Times changing hydro help free

Georgetown Hydro Commission will not be billed by the Acton Commission for emergency work done after last month's tornado.

At last Thursday's monthly meeting of the Acton group, office manager Audrey Urquhart pointed out an outstanding bill of \$114 for an employee's wages while working overtime to restore power to affected areas in Georgetown. She said she had just mailed them a bill a few days before.

Commissioners Ted Tyler Sr. and Bob MacArthur said they were against the billing. "We never know when we are going to need emergency help. If they send for us next week or next month, they are entitled to be billed for it, but not for an emergency," Mr. Tyler said.

Chairman Will McEachern and commissioners Orville Brown and Mr. MacArthur were in complete agreement with the suggestion.

Mrs. Urquhart was told to notify the Georgetown office that the bill is to be ignored. "Things have really

changed," Mr. Tyler pointed out. "At one time we would have said 'hell with Georgetown'."
