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Seeking back pay

Former Acton police officer Alan Dyack, Brantford, who left the Halton Regional Police force in May, wants his back pay now that a 1976 police contract has been settled.

Dyack wrote to Halton Police Commission stating he is entitled to more money for the first four months of this year since the police recently received a 8.3 per cent raise for this year.

Chief Ken Skerrett told the Commission Thursday he has written to Dyack and in-

formed him the force is waiting for a court settlement on a similar request from an officer who left the Halton police in 1975 and wanted some back pay because of a contract settlement raise.

The commission decided to wait until the courts make a ruling on the 1975 request before ruling on Dyack's.

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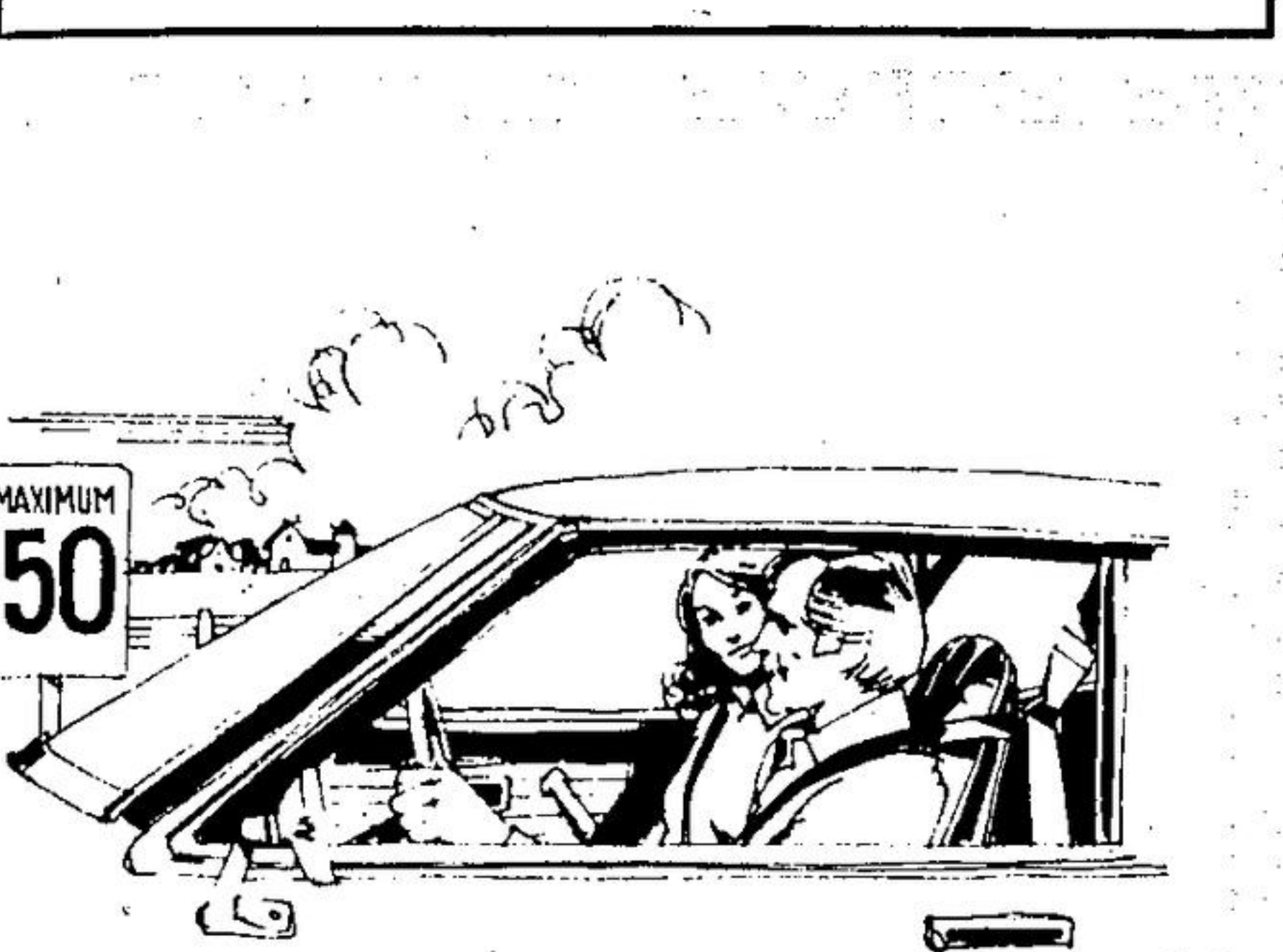
