Swedish firm buys Disston

A proposal by Viska Incorporated of New Jersey. wholly-owned subsidiary of Sandvik Incorporated, also of New Jersey, to acquire control of Disston Canada Ltd. Acton, and of Jean-Paul Rouel Inc. of St. Romauld, Quebec, has been approved by the Cabinet following recommendations by the Foreign Investment Review Agency. Both companies are controlled by Disston Incorporated of Pittsburg Pennsyl-

Sandvik Incorporated of New Jersey is controlled by

Sandvik AB of Sweden, one of the largest manufacturers of special steels and tools in Sweden.

The sale, completed in February, was subject to the decision of the Review

No changes are anticipated at Disston here, according to Tom Shields. The plant produces hand tools, saws and industrial knives. Jean Paul produces carbide tipped sawbands and sawblades and machine blades for the furniture industry.
