Stratford won the annual Rockwood juvenile girls' softball by clipping Preston 8-7 in the final.

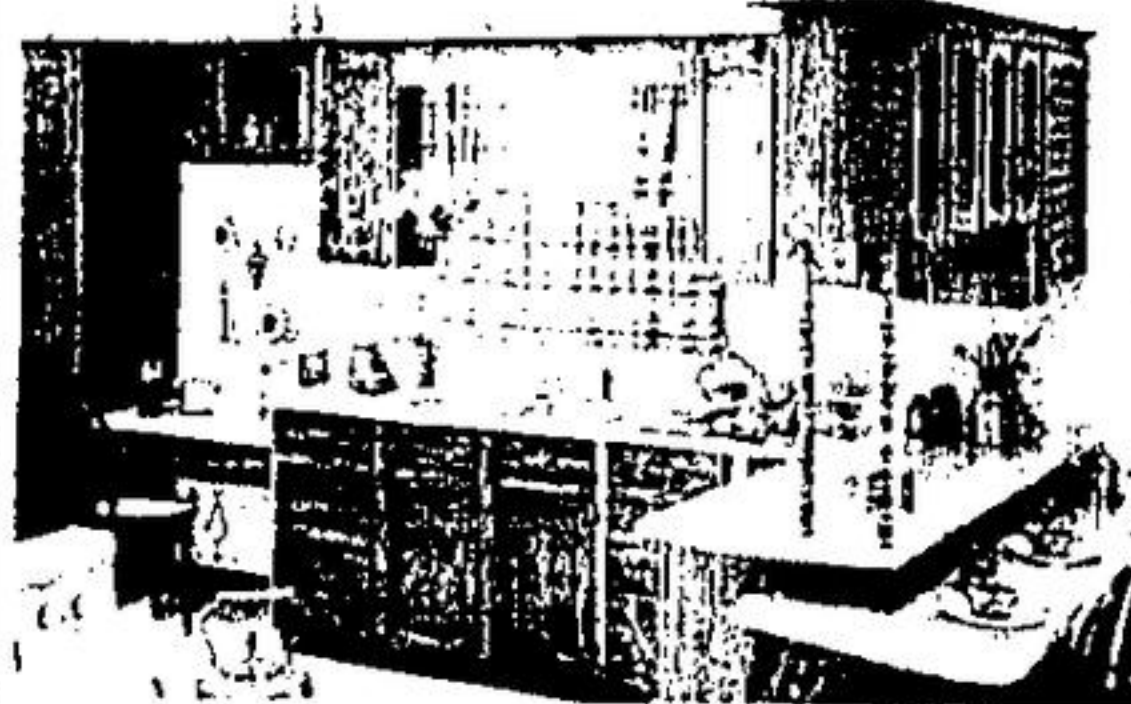
In the consolation round Hillsburgh edged Rockwood 5-4, though the host club led 4-0 going into the seventh inning.

EXT 8476 Needlepoint
 This course will cover needlework as an art form. Students will be encouraged to experiment with various textures, colours and techniques.

EXT 8449 Yoga
