Summer school very successful

Enrolment for high school programs is down but up for elementary school courses summer school, Principal Willard Price told Halton Board of Education Thursday. He said the summer school was successful.

During the summer of 1975, 1,389 students received credits towards their high school diploma at summer school while only 1,308 completed credit courses this past summer. A dramatic drop in summer school enrolment in Oakville was blamed for the decrease.

Elementary school summer program enrolment jumped from 2,413 students in 1975 to 2,467 pupils this past summer. Trustee Tony Goodyear

criticised the use of three Masters of Education candidates who assisted Price in counselling pupils from the Ontario Institute in Studies in Education.

"O.I.S.E. is an intellectual playground," Goodyear declared. He wondered if the people from O.I.S.E. were impressed with "our playground?"
