### Eramosa council sends money for AMO cause

Eramosa township council is sending \$41 to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario in order to help pay for costs to prevent Ontario Hydro from raising their rates 30 per cent.

The AMO had asked municipalities across Ontario to contribute one cent per capita to their cause. The increase, AMO states, is against the rules of the Anti-Inflation Board guidelines. The organization also claims the money received from the increase would go towards the expansion of hydro plant.
