Halton Hills won't get leaf vacuum picker

The town won't be getting a leaf vacuum picker.

Engineer Robert Austin told Halton Hills works committee that his department has budgeted \$5,500 for the purchase of the machine but between inflation and a new tariff the price has jumped to over \$10,000.

He said at the same time the town's inefficient three wheel street sweeper needs \$6,000 in repairs.

Austin informed the committee he plans to try and persuade next year's works committee to allow the purchase of a faster more efficient four wheeled street sweeper which will also do the leaf vacuum picker's job and cleans catch basins, too. He added the new machine would cost between \$60,000

and \$65,000.
