# Budget guidelines set by treasurer

A maximum of an eight per cent increase has been set by the Halton Hills Finance committee for departments when making up their 1977 operating budgets.

Town treasurer Ray King explained at Monday evening's meeting of the committee that the town was trying to stay within the Federal Government's Anti-Inflation Guidelines.

Councillor Harry Levy told the group he hoped budgets would be less than the maximum of eight per cent. Mr. King told the committee that he thought a maximum of seven per cent should be set, but didn't want to put council into the bad position of not having sufficient funds in some departments.

Mr. King explained that if any department handed in a budget of over eight per cent, they would have to answer to their perspective committees. Finance members agreed

the eight per cent would be a good goal. "We are not travelling into the Red Sea," Clerk Administrator Doug Pritchard pointed out. He complimented the town treasurer's department on a job well done throughout the year and stated that Halton Hills is being termed a model town when it comes to finance

Chairman Ernie Sykes said the purchase of the computer was the best investment made by the town as it has more than paid for itself.
