

Lakers bow to Blow Hellers and Vans make it two in a row

Blow Press and Vans made it two in a row while Hellers inked their first win of the season during Acton Industrial Hockey League play Sunday.

Van's Welding trounced Station Hotel 9-1, Blow Press dominated Lakeview 7-2 and Hellers got by Kens 8-6.

Mid-way through the Station-Vans game, Hotellers' Bill Severinski cut Van's 2-0 lead in half with a goal from Bruce Cocksley. Van's, however, fired four more goals in reply during that period and added three in the third for an easy 9-1 win.

Floyd Hillier, who scored four goals and assisted on one, opened the game in the first period with a goal from Ernie Waller. Jim Cole started his hatrick 3:05 minutes later from his brother Terry.

Round Terry also combined with Eric Stone to set up Bruce McPherson for Van's first se-

cond period counter. Stone next helped on Jim Cole's second goal from McPherson. In all McPherson got two assists.

Floyd and Jim dived up most of the remaining goals but left Dave Morris to round out the scoring for Van's from Keith Osmond.

Morris and Ken Owen collected two assists. Vans scored twice in the first, got four in the second and three in the third.

In the Lakeview Blow Press encounter, Lakers took an early 1-0 lead on John Ashley's goal from Ron Mellon and Lorne Gordon. Pete Morrison, however, twice joined John Mason and John Kavanaugh to first tie and then to fire BP's winning goal.

Steve Townsley got the second Laker goal, an unassisted one in the third.

Mason, who later scored three straight goals, started BP correctly at the 5:15 mark of the first period.

Brian Irwin was the other Press marksman.
