Mother, two children die in Erin house fire

A young mother and her two young children died tragically in a house fire in Erin township Tuesday of last

Bonnie Slack and Heather, two and a half, and Kendall, just turned four, lost their lives in their own home on the 10th Line. The father, an Air Canada pilot, was away in Switzerland at the time.

The funeral service was at New Hamburg Friday with interment at Woodlawn Cemetery, Guelph. Although the service was private, the funeral procession stretched for a mile.

The Ontario Fire Marshal's office, Ontario Hydro and the Ministry of Consumer and Relations, Commercial Energy safety branch, are investigating the fire-a routine procedure.

The body of the family dog was also found in the ruins. The fire was first seen about 1 a.m. by a neighbor and the firefighters were there 10 minutes after the alarm was given. The Slack property is located midway between Highway 24 and 22 Sideroad on the 10th Line of Erin township. They had lived there about five years.

Mrs. Slack was the former Bonita Jean Colley, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Henry Colley of New Hamburg; she has two sisters Jacqueline (Mrs. Alan Julke), Hespeler and Judith (Mrs. Larry Shantz), Waterloo, Mr. Slack comes from Montreal. His mother died suddenly June 30.

The Erin Advocate, the home town paper in the district, reported it had no desire to go into the heart-rending details. 

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Credit plaque

A Niagara Escarpment geological plaque identifying the Credit River Gorge at Cataract, 10 miles southeast of Orangeville, will be unveiled Oct. 30 at a public ceremony. It is the second of 12 plaques to be erected at significant scenic, historical and geologic sites through the Escarpment.

The inscription on the plaque reads: "The rock face opposite displays an excellent contact between grey sandstone of the Whirlpool Formation and reed shales of the underlying and older Queenston Formation. These layered sedimentary rocks were deposited in ancient seas of the Paleozoic Era, over 400 million years ago, and form part of the Niagara
