But how can you murmur gentle poetry when both kids are hollering that they don't need to wear their winter boots and they've grown out of them anyway?

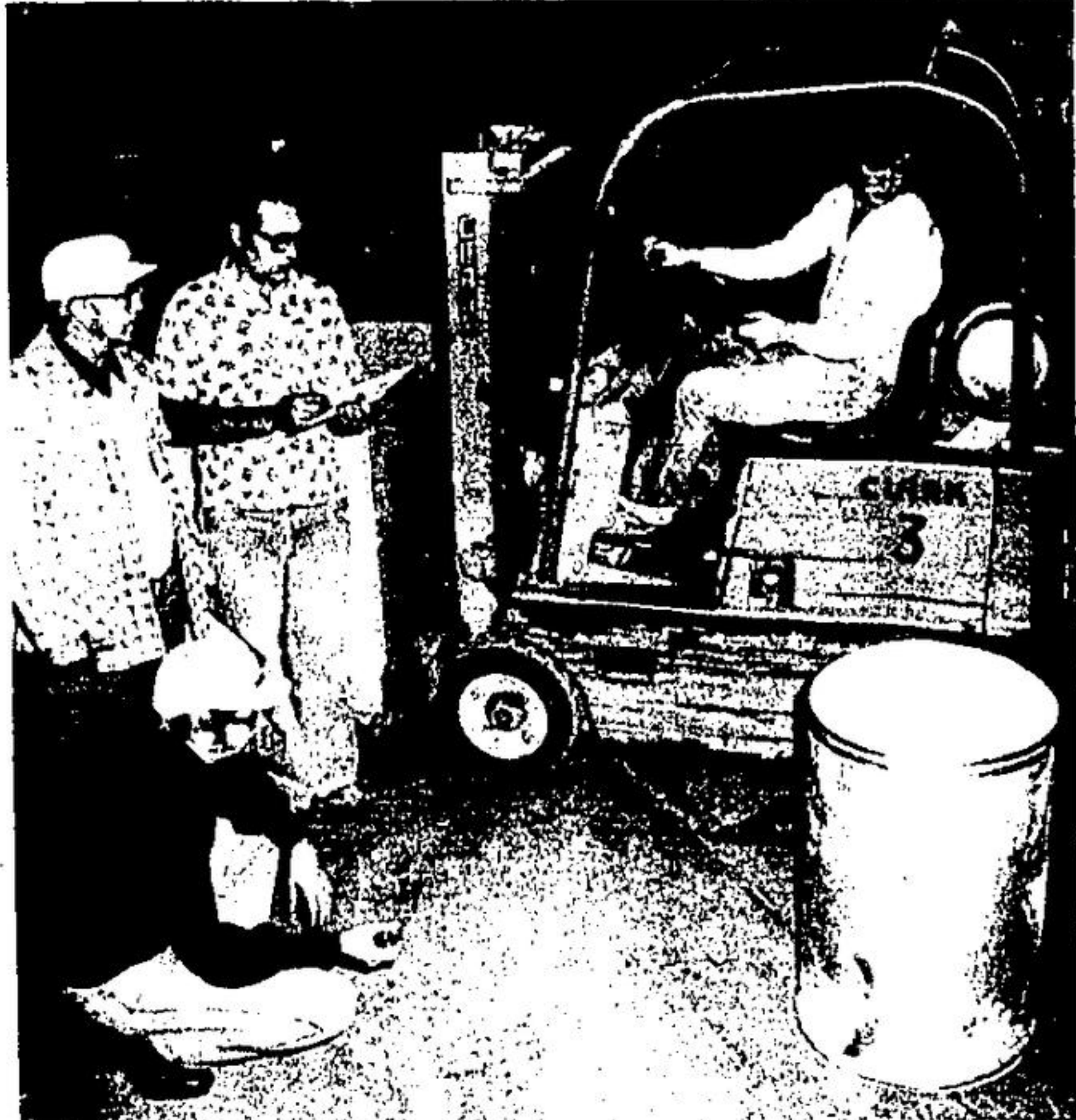
