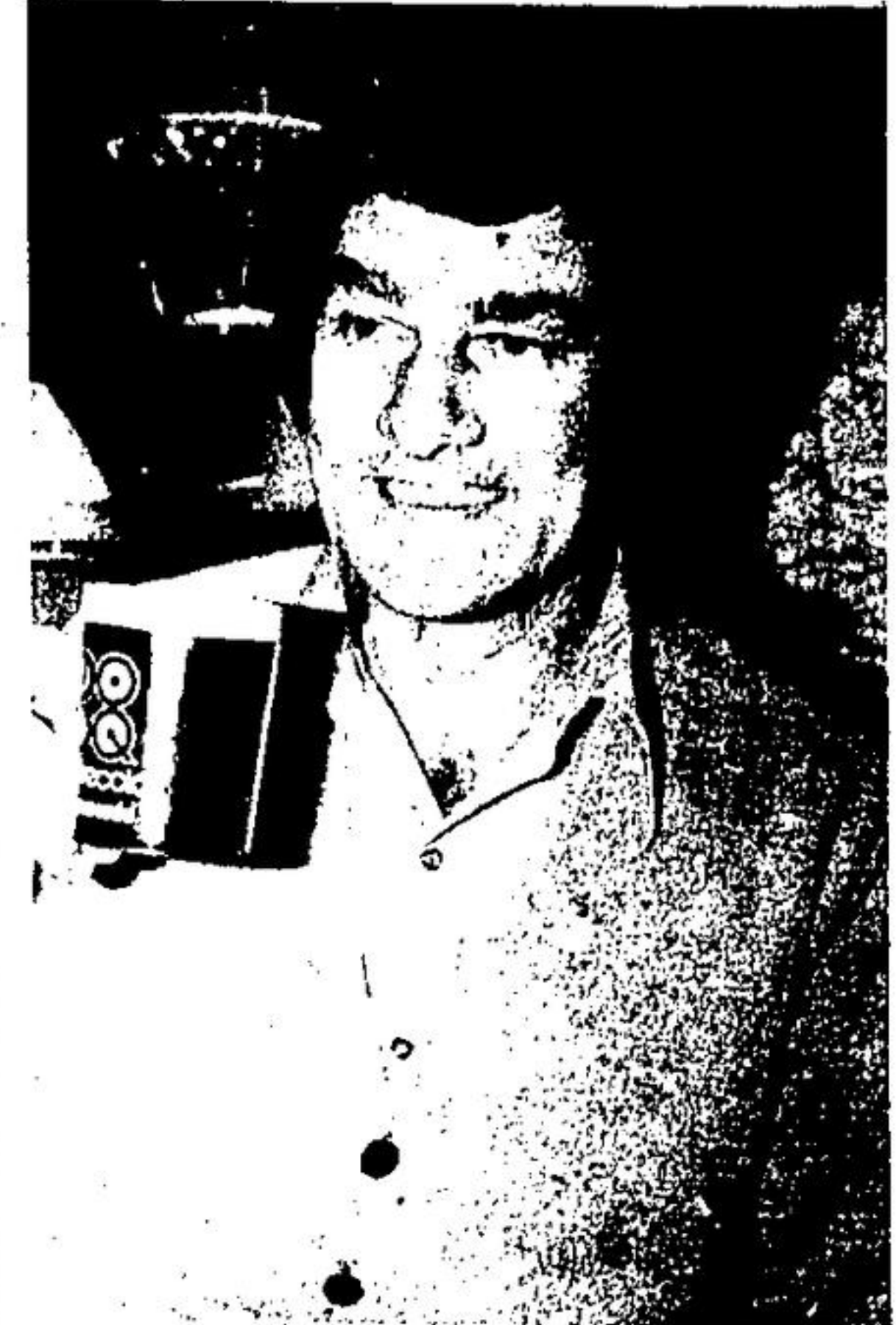

Business biography First of a series

Jake Kuiken involved in people, life, family



JAKE KUIKEN is the owner of Halton Hills Furniture and Appliances. He is featured in the Free Press first of a series entitled "Business Biography".

Jake Kuiken is a man on the move, interested not only in the welfare of his family, but also his customers and the other merchants in town. Owner of Halton Hills Furniture and Appliances in the Becker's Plaza, Jake came to Canada from Holland when 14 years old and lived with his family in Mount Brydges, near London. Twelve years ago, he got a job with Hollandia Bakery delivering baked goods. Acton was part of his route. Jake soon retired from the delivery business and opened a restaurant in Waterdown. After two and a half years in this business, he sold out to come to Acton to try his hand in the furniture business. Three dealer-award trips and four years later Jake says the business is exciting. He enjoys meeting his customers and making friends. Jennifer, his wife, and he have visited Puerto Rico, Acapulco and Switzerland, free trips from various dealers for sales accomplishments. Jake says he has his customers to thank for the vacations. The store takes up six days of Jake's time, and several evenings. However, even with this strict schedule, his life is not totally devoted to his business. He still finds time to belong to the Acton Chamber of Commerce, the Red Cross, the North-Halton Association for the Mentally Retarded and the Georgetown and District Christian School. Jake wanted to emphasize his opinion of the Mill St. reconstruction situation. Even though he agrees the work was necessary, he feels it is a poor time of year to be doing it. "No time is the right time to tear up the street," he says, "but summer would have been better for the merchants and the customer." Jake encourages people to patronize the downtown merchants and to support them in their present situation. He explains that customer satisfaction is what everyone works for, and to satisfy consumer needs. He continued to say if he were in the business just to make money he would move to a big city and open a big name store. Instead, Jake prefers the quiet, friendly life of a small town and satisfied customers. Jake and Jennifer have four children, Ron, 17; Janet, 15; Danny, 14 and Barb 12, and live at R.R. 2, Acton.

Whalen gives history lesson

Acton Chamber of Commerce president Louis Charlebois asked Minister of Agriculture Eugene Whalen why bilingualism is receiving so much controversy when he appeared at last week's Georgetown Chamber of Commerce dinner. Whalen answered the question with another of his own. "What makes Canada? Why isn't it part of the United States?" the Minister queried. He said one has to go back to the beginnings of the country when the British wanted the help of French settlers in repelling American invasion. They promised the habitants freedom of religion and rights of language. "But we've never lived by the constitution," Whalen said. Bilingualism, Whalen said some adjustments in the program have to be made. He suggested that French should be available when "we are little kids" and able to grow with the language. Although Prime Minister Trudeau is often blamed for pushing bilingualism, Mr. Whalen said the program was started by Mr. Diefenbaker when he was Prime Minister of Canada.
