Memorial service in Nassagaweya

A couple of dozen people turned out at the Remembrance Day Memorial Service Sunday held at the Soldiers' Memorial, Nassagaweya, under the auspices of the Mayor and council of the town of Milton and the Acton and District Legion.

The Rev. Russel Finley led the hymns and the ceremony. Mrs. Helen Cooper placed the wreath for the province of Ontario on the Memorial, with Milton Mayor Anne MacArthur placing the

wreath for her town, and Bob Angell for the Acton Legion. The reading of the names of World War I and II victims followed.

Those who gave their lives from the Nassagaweya area from 1914 to 1918 were Stanley R. Adamson, Arthur Hadley, Edward Harrison, Charles M. Carbert, Orville Fletcher, Edward Hamman, James Milne, Clarence Carlton, John H. Blair, William Grahame, William Pollock, Mark McIntyre, L. J. Kingsbury,

Harvey Elliot, Wesley Roberts, H. C. Elsey, Fred Hilson, Joseph Fryer, Allan Reading, Howard C. Robinson, William Roberts and Melvin Bonas.

Five men gave their lives from 1939 to 1945: Clayton Taylor, Peter McLaren, Clarence Elsey, Marshall Wilson and Cecil Wilson.

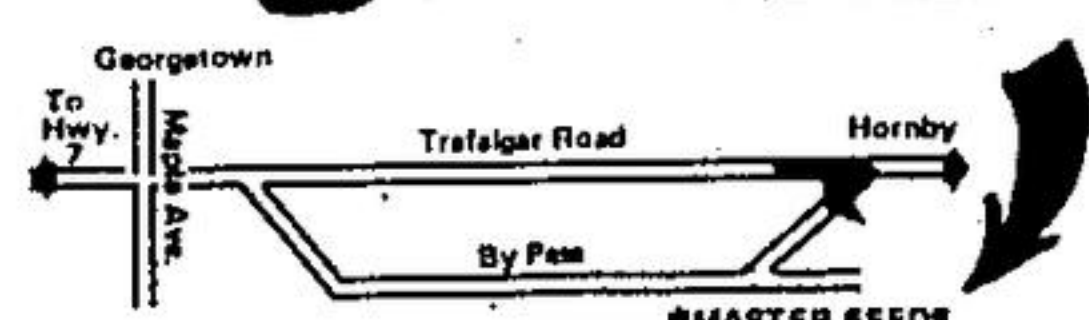

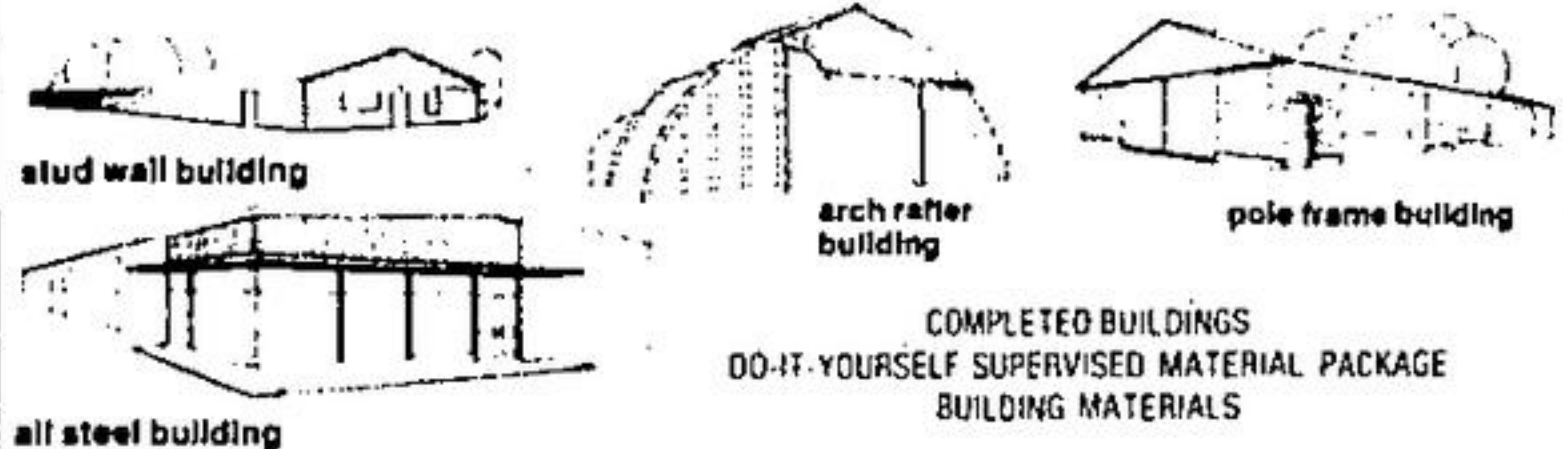
