Halton member of Parliament, Dr. Frank Philbrook announced last week that a Local Initiatives Program grant of \$14,960 has been granted to Halton Hills.

The grant is for the repair and clean-up of community centres, including bringing the Hornby, Norval, Georgetown Fairgrounds club house, Acton arena, block house, filtration plant building, and Cedarvale community centre up to a better level of repair. The project will employ four persons for 88 man weeks.
