(Continued from Page 1) who works for the City of Mississauga and lives on 22 Sideroad, and George Maltby are two of the candidates. Maltby lost out in his bid for election in 1973 and then was appointed to fill Dick Howitt's seat on area council after Howitt was bumped up to regional council to fill the vacancy created by the death of Len Cox.

C. F. "Pat" Patterson, a former Esquering councillor and Norval area farmer, and real estate appraiser and consultant Stephen Saxe are the other two candidates in the four man race.

Ward Three
Roy Booth, Fred "Tut" Harrison and Ernie Sykes will battle it out for the one Ward Three, Georgetown, seat on Halton regional council. Sykes is the incumbent in the race while Booth is trying to move up to the regional level from his present position of area councillor for

Ward Three. Harrison is trying a comeback in municipal politics after serving six years on old Georgetown councils.

Voters have a choice between four people for the two spots on Halton Hills council for ward three area councillors.

Walter Biehn, a clerk who lives on Queen Street and former Herald publisher; sitting area councillor and former mayor of Georgetown, Ern Hyde; Norval resident and downtown businessman Peter Pomeroy and real estate salesman Dan Timmons have all entered the race.

Ward Four
Ric Morrow doesn't have to worry about campaigning after receiving his second straight acclamation as Ward Four's regional councillor. At the area level three men and one woman have entered the race for two seats. Former Georgetown

councillor Mike Armstrong, who lost in the 1973 election and then was appointed by council to fill the vacancy created by the sudden death of Graham Ripley, is one candidate.

The other three are all newcomers to politics: Cec Martin, Prince Charles Drive, a caterer; former Halton Hills engineer Peter Morris; and a nurse who lives on Reagan Crescent, Marilyn Serjeantson have all entered the race.

HALTON BOARD OF EDUCATION
Wards Three and Four
Two political novices, investment counsellor Don Long and Barry Shepherd, who works for Kodak, will fight it out for the one Georgetown seat on Halton Board of Education. Trustee Ernie Bodnar has retired.

Wards One and Two
Three people will fight it out for the combined Acton-Esquering seat on Halton Board of Education. Former Halton County Warden H. H. "Bert" Hinton, a newcomer who lives in Terra Cotta, Doug Pierce and incumbent trustee Tom Watson are all in the race for one seat.

Halton Board of Education - Halton Hills, Milton
Separate supporters seat John Bradley, Milton, has won this seat by acclamation. This is the first time North Halton has had a seat on Halton Board of Education for separate school supporters. Previously Halton Hills, Milton and Oakville separate supporters shared a trustee.

Halton Separate School Board
Wards One, Two, Three and Four
Incumbent trustee and chairman of the board Hartley Sherk will meet Tom Simmons, an accountant.

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Delay debate

A piece of town-owned land at Mill Street and Acton Boulevard in Acton could become six lots with 65 foot frontage each.

Planner Mario Venditti said he had been asked to recommend use for the land, designated a park, but never used as one.

He said the land would have to be rezoned. Councillor Les DUBY asked that any discussion be held over until next year's council takes over.

Councillor Joe Hurst said he agreed with DUBY. He said he lived right near the intersection, and could come to council as an interested citizen and talk about it.

Councillor Hurst is retiring from local politics, and is not running for office in the December elections.

(Continued from page 1) have originated when the gravel was put on Wallace when the Mill St. construction started.

The councillor said one route suggested to by-pass the town would be up the Fifth Line, along the Town Line, joining up with Highway 7 at Crewson's Corners. A new road could also be built behind the curling club. He said the province would have to be petitioned for this or any other by-pass.

Mr. DUBY said that when he was mayor in 1965, the province had plans to build a by-pass from Toronto, avoiding Georgetown, Acton and Guelph, and coming out at Kitchener. However, he said the project was low on the priority list and was shelved.

Mr. DUBY said he felt the concerned group should send some representatives to council and get behind him in the plans. In this way, Mr. DUBY said, there would be more weight behind his suggestion.

One gentleman asked if the traffic would still be going up Wallace once the Mill St. construction was finished. Mr. Austin explained that "there is no intention to change the route (off Mill)".
