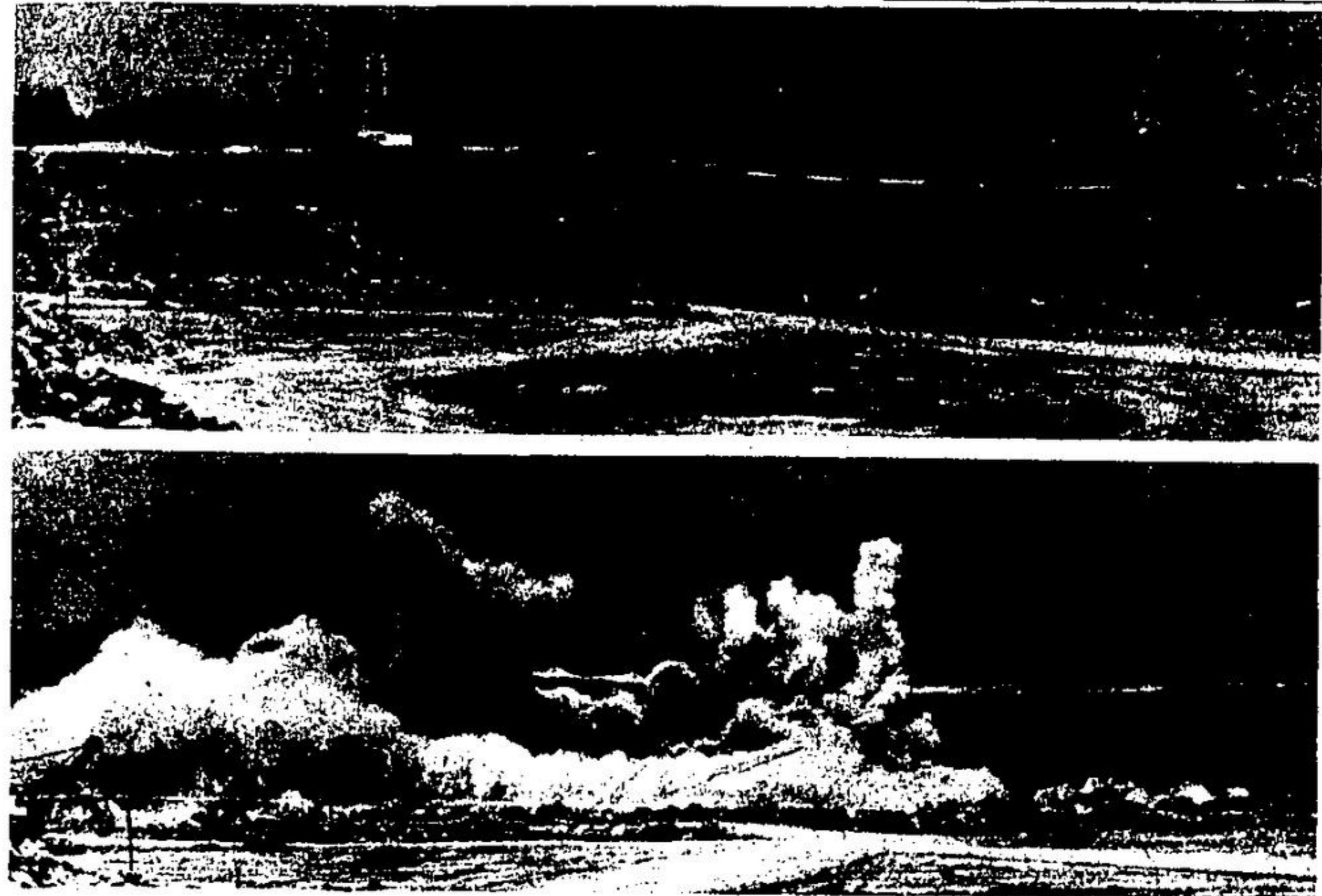

## Area siren screeches — then BOOM!

Blasts at Acton quarry impressed a student working with Indusmin for the summer, and he wrote about it for the company magazine Indusmin Link.

"The story reads: 'Boom!'

"From 2000 feet away, the solid rock cliff seems to break apart as though it were sand. Then the vibrations run past underneath the quarry's rock floor and still later you hear the solid boom of nearly ten tons of explosives busting through limestone.

"Indusmin's Aggregates Division tries to blast at the Acton quarry every three days, keeping that ever-hungry primary crusher fed with rock.

"The 18,900 pounds of explosives, a combination of hydromex and ammonium nitrate, used in each blast can break apart 41 thousand tons of rock in the space of one second.

"The quarry crews can clear away the rock in three days, necessitating the frequent blasts. The plant can't set off a larger detonation because of local restrictions

and consideration for the area residents. The operation is limited to 14 holes—the explosives are sent down each of these holes and connected by a primacord.

"The primacord is also highly explosive and is linked to an electrical wire running from the plunger to the first blasting cap. The blasting cap sets off the explosive in the first hole which sets off the primacord, which causes each hole in turn to explode.

"All this happens in under a second. Despite the fearsome energy released by the blast,

driller Frank Spielvogel and blaster John Duffield know exactly what the results of their work will be.

"John bores the two-inch diameter blast holes down 68 feet, five feet below the quarry surface which will create an even floor when the rubble is cleared away. He uses a massive rock drill mounted on a tractor body for mobility.

"Frank lowers 250 pounds of Hydromex jelly in plastic bags to the bottom of each of the holes. Then he pours in the ammonium nitrate, or

prills as it's also known. The chemical is mixed with fuel oil in just the right proportions to make the usually inert substance highly explosive.

"The detonators and primacord are attached. The area is cleared of all personnel and equipment; the warning siren screeches, then, boom!

"From there the broken rock is scooped up and sent through the primary crusher and broken into different grades for the finished aggregate products."

## Sr. citizen apts. defer manor need

Construction of senior citizen housing in Halton Region in the past few years has staved off the need for a new home for the aged according to Halton Centennial Manor Administrator Stan Allen.

Mr. Allan made the statement during a meeting of Halton Region's Administration Committee Wednesday. He told the committee that

many of the people who would have moved to the Manor when they gave up their own homes have opted for Ontario Housing Commission apartments instead.

Had the apartments not been constructed a new home would have been required two years ago according to statistical information Mr. Allen has.

Waiting list He indicated that the extended care branch of the home continues to be under pressure to accommodate more people and a waiting list does exist. On the other hand there are still some vacancies in the residential wing of the home.

Mr. Allen said he anticipated increased pressures on the extended care beds noting that many of the people who went to the apartments will not be able to continue there and will want to be admitted to the Manor where nursing care does exist.

In an interview this week Mr. Allen said consideration had been given several years ago to locating a home in Oakville or Burlington. He set a sinking fund had been set up to accumulate funds for the project but the construction was deferred when Ontario Housing Corporation began erecting senior citizen apartments in the region and an old age residential home in Oakville.

"I have maintained a graph for years that pretty well forecast what would happen with the waiting list. But

cope in an apartment did not come.

"They have managed there now for two or three years but more and more we are getting applications from people in the senior citizens' apartment and the home in Oakville," Mr. Allen explained.

He predicted a trend that will bring people from those places to the extended care wing of the Manor. Extensive nursing care isn't available in the Oakville home or the apartments.
