2. To cut and prune selectively trees and shrubs on the strip and to keep it clear of all trees, shrubs and ferns which may interfere with the safe operation and maintenance of the line.
3. To clear the strip and keep it clear of all buildings, structures or other obstructions of any nature whatever. Notwithstanding the foregoing, in all cases where in the sole discretion of Ontario Hydro the safe operation and maintenance of the line is not endangered or interfered with by the landowner from time to time or the person or persons entitled thereto may with prior written approval of Ontario Hydro at his or their own expense construct and maintain roads, lanes, walks, drains, sewers, water pipes, oil and gas pipelines, and fences on or under the strip or any portion thereof, provided that prior to commencing any such installation the landowner shall give to Ontario Hydro 30-days' notice in writing so as to enable Ontario Hydro to have a representative inspect the site and be present during the performance of the work and that the landowner complies with any instructions that may be given by any such representative in order that such work may be carried out in such a manner as not to endanger, damage or interfere with the line.
4. To erect, maintain and use bridges and such gates in all fences which are now or may hereafter be on the strip as Ontario Hydro may from time to time consider necessary.
5. To install at a minimum depth of 12 inches below the surface of the land, and maintain, and use in, over, along and where required within the strip.
6. To enter on and to pass and repass at any and all times in, over, along and upon the strip for the servants, agents, contractors and subcontractors of Ontario Hydro with or without vehicles, supplies, machinery and equipment for all purposes necessary or convenient to the exercise and enjoyment of the right, privilege and easement hereby explicated subject to payment by Ontario Hydro of compensation for any crop or other damage to the person entitled thereto caused by the exercise of this right of entry and passageway.

"I'm a believer in the swine flu immunization program," Minister of Health Frank Miller assured reporters Wednesday night in Burlington as he touched his arm gingerly.

He had received a two strain shot that day that would provide immunization against both the swine and Australian flu.

Questioned about the apparent lack of interest in clinics in the Hamilton area, the Minister said the people most concerned with the flu were the press.

He cautioned though, that after the injection it takes three to four weeks for the antibodies to build up the immunization.

New Health Council catalyst — Minister

"The Ministry of Health looks upon District Health Councils as a catalyst in the

restructuring of health services in Ontario," the Minister of Health Frank S. Miller said when he spoke at the meeting of the Halton District Health Council Wednesday in Burlington.

The Minister was officially inaugurating the Halton Health Council, a 15-member group announced in July of this year and headed by Chairman Terence F. Baines of Georgetown.

Pat McKenzie is the Acton member of the council.

Clarifying the difference between a Health Unit and a Health Council, the Minister explained the Health Unit is a deliverer of services while the Health Council is a group of volunteers who will examine needs and surpluses in the area, in the field of health services.

"I realize they aren't going to work wonders off the bat but the job is to help systematize health care. There are 26 professions in the field of health care," the Minister explained.

The Halton District Health Council is already examining proposals regarding mental health programs and laboratory services in Halton.

The Council will prepare recommendations to the Minister, after sorting out local priorities.

"They are advisory," the Minister explained of the Health Councils. I can't accept all the advice I'm given and I will tell the Councils not to be disappointed if I don't always accept what they recommend."

Local advisers "Local people should be advisors to the Minister, but they can't be advocates for everything that comes along in the area or they'll fail," the Minister pointed out.

The Health Council members are all volunteers, the minister emphasized. He estimated each Council would cost the province about \$50,000 annually. The majority of the funds would be directed to staffing and accommodation with a small amount for travel. Members

of the Council are unpaid. The Health Council program in Ontario is currently in its third year with 16 or 17 already established. It is expected there will be 18 councils established in the province by the end of the year.

Human Services help In remarks prepared for delivery to the closed session of the Health Council, the Minister said the Council "was conceived out of a cooperative effort by Halton Human Services Council, the Region of Halton and the Ministry of Health."

The Halton Human Services Council, formed about 18 months ago, was set up jointly by the Ministries of Education, Health, Community and Social Services and Corrections. This group attempted to co-ordinate the professional talent to work on mutual problems within Halton.

Noting the Halton Health Council had already begun work on the mental health and laboratory service areas, the Minister emphasized his department was concentrating more resources on the development of outpatient services in mental health programs. In the laboratory field, the Ministry was encouraging maximum use of existing hospital facilities.

"We are not trying to close private medical laboratories but we are trying to get maximum use out of existing hospital laboratories."

Priorities Spelling out priorities for the coming year for the new Health Council, Mr. Miller called for development of an organizational structure "that will relate to all health and allied social services within your jurisdiction, and secondly you will need to inventory all health care facilities and services, including volunteer agencies."

The Minister noted the District Health Councils "are one concrete way in which the provincial government is attempting to decentralize planning to ensure that local considerations receive full and complete attention."

Local advice Council role

The Minister of Health, Frank Miller emphasized he had no plans for further hospital closings, when he was interviewed at the inaugural of the Halton Health Council.

"Hopefully if that becomes necessary again it will be on the recommendation of District Health Councils."

The Minister was outlining the role of District Health Councils and their recommendations to the Ministry on services and ways to introduce savings in the health care field.

Mr. Miller noted the province had almost as many chronic care beds as active treatment beds, when questioned about shortening the stay of patients in hospitals. He pointed out the province had about 35,000 insured

nursing home beds and 37,000 active treatment beds.

Cut costs too "If Health Councils come up with recommendations that require extra funds, hopefully they will also have recommendations to reduce costs," the Minister observed.

Questioned about communication within the area and with regional council, the Minister explained the Halton District Health Council included three members of regional council. "They're not there in name only. They're there to represent Regional Council," the Minister emphasized.

One of the problems cited in the Human Services Council was lack of communication with regional council when the two groups met recently.

Board to hire negotiator for teacher contract talks

Halton Board of Education will be hiring a new staff member to work on teacher contract negotiations and Bill 100 provincial legislation governing teacher-board contract talks and strikes.

In presenting the proposal for the new position of administrative-assistant for instruction, Director of Education Em Lavender said, Thursday, it was not an add-on position. It is to be created by shifting other staff around and giving them new responsibilities.

He said in the event a teacher is chosen for the new job, which will pay \$20,000 a year, then that person must sever all relationships with any teachers' federations.

Lavender noted the number of board employees effected by Bill 100 is sizable but there are some people working for the board who aren't teachers who might be able to fill the position.

He explained there will be considerable training needed

by the successful applicant. He noted Superintendent of Instruction John Boich will provide much of it.

Trustee Bill Priestner was opposed to any teacher being hired for the new job even if they have quit the federation while Trustee Edna Robinson said a person with teaching experience could be more effective.

Priestner said considering the salary being offered he thought the board would more than likely end up hiring a recent university graduate who wants to get into the management end of education and doubted the board could get anyone at that price with very much teaching experience.

Boich agreed the board probably wouldn't get someone as experienced as it wants. "What I am looking for is someone who is eager to learn because there will have to be a lot of training and I will be giving most of it."

Trustee Richard Goodin suggested the jobs of Superintendent of Program and Superintendent of Instruction combined with the board letting Superintendent of Program Bruce Mather go, and having administrative assistants take over some of the work load.

Trustee Len Crosier noted the new job will only add \$5,000 to board costs so there was no reason to fire one of the superintendents.

Lavender said he was "dumbfounded" by the suggestion and wondered how the board could possibly find one person who could do the two jobs even with the help of administrative assistants.

He said the new job would likely be a long term appointment since contract negotiations and the implication of Bill 100 will continue to grow in importance "as long as the present environment continues."
