### Bow hunting season popular in Halton

Halton hunters and sportsmen have responded enthusiastically to the opening of a bow and arrow deer hunting season this

The season began Oct. 25 and ends Nov.

"I know of about 12 of our members who have bought bows for it," said Lorne Lyons, hunting director for the Halton Sportsmen's Association.

Although there has been a deer hunting season in Halton before, Lyons couldn't remember one that was just restricted to the use of bow and arrows.

"It's more of a challenge with a bow," Lyons said. "I know there have been times where we would have had a deer if we were using a gun."

He said a shotgun shell will scatter, making accuracy less important than with a how. With a gun a couple of back cartridges can be shot if the first shot misses, but with a bow a hunter has only one

'Pick up arrow' "And after you miss, you have to pick up

the arrow." he joked. Although it's harder to hit the deer, Lyons thought there was a better chance of killing

the deer with a bow. Lyons put a five-inch sheet of plywood behind a practice target and shot a hunting arrow at it from 40 feet away. He claims the arrow not only went through the target, but

it also went through the plywood. "Can you imagine what that does to a

'deer?" he asked. Two types of bows Two types of bows, the longbow and the crossbow are available for the hunter. Lyons said the longbow is harder to adapt

to than the crossbow which he compared to shooting a gun. "You can learn how to use one in an

Members of the club are split evenly on which bow they use. The association has a practice range which Lyons said is used extensively. The targets are 40 yards away because this is as close as a hunter usually

"You have to be pretty good on the practice range before you can go hunting," Lyons said.

Three killed

To date, Lyons knows of only three deer which have been killed by bow-hunters.

The Ministry of Natural Resources office in Cambridge has documented only five killings in the district which entails Waterloo, Wellington, Wentworth, Brant and Halton regions. They estimate at the most about 30 to 35 deer will be killed.

Bruce Buckland, from the ministry, said they are offering crests to all hunters who bring deer hides into the Cambridge offices and a flourescent cap with a crest for any deer jaws.

After work Lyons said he does most of his hunting

for one deer.

after he gets off work. A longbow can be bought for as little as \$35 and as high as \$200. The crossbow which most of the hunters in the association are using is available for \$70. Lyons said arrows cost between \$1.50 and \$6 each. Deer
