Engineer Robert Austin said he would prePare a report for the next works committee meeting outlining all locations where new signs are needed. Where the Fifth Line meets

Highway 7 is one location where a new sign could be installed, Austin said Mon-Councillor Joe Hurst said

he thought the province might be hinting at the different road numbering signs used by Halton Hills and the region when the letter from Queen's Park mentioned "uniform system".

Austin said the new signs would designate Halton Road 3 (Seventh Line) by its new official name Trafalgar Road. Provincial approval is pending for official change of the name for Halton Road 3.


