She hopes that experience gained throughout the past term in office will provide a greater insight to problems which may arise in the future.

The best way to do so was to become involved in community affairs. Having served two years on the board of trustees, he would like to remain for another term, and endeavour to work for the interests of the village residents.

Harold Tomlinson has been a resident of Eden Mills for 26 years. He is very concerned about the growth and planning for the village of Eden Mills.

There are several items remaining on this year's agenda, and he would like to follow them through to completion in the new term. He helped with the comple-

tion of the village community centre under the auspices of an L.P. grant, and is an active member of the community club and also on the building committee.

Township council However, it is a different story at Eramosa township council.

Contesting Bill Adsett's seat for Reeve is Joseph Oakes, of R.R. 1, Rockwood.

The present Reeve, Mr. Adsett is campaigning to keep his seat. He is just finishing up his first year as reeve, and had been a township councillor for six years prior to that. For the past two years, Mr. Adsett also sat on Wellington County council.

Both are also up against Arthur Harris for the top spot on council. A story on Mr. Harris appeared in last week's Free Press.

The battle for Deputy Reeve is between the incumbent Betty Lou Clark and incumbent councillor John Hewitt.

Mrs. Clark served on council as councillor for two years before being elected deputy-reeve in the last election. She is on Wellington County Council. She has also been very active on several committees and boards in the past several years.

Running against Mrs. Clark is John Hewitt. Mr. Hewitt is at present a councillor, starting his political career after moving to the area from London. She has served as building inspector in Fergus, on the Fergus hospital board, Eramosa planning board and the Hortop Mill Committee.

Seeking re-election as councillors are Alan Burnett and Dave Masson. Both were undecided if they would run or not when the Free Press published in-depth stories of the present council on October 13. However, they each thought over the decision and tossed their hats in the ring.

Mr. Burnett was new to the council chambers when elected in 1974. In the past two years, he sat on the medical centre committee, roads committee and recreation committee, and was also part of the team, with Mr. Hewitt, which looked into the Rockwood septic systems problems. He viewed his first term as a learning period which he has enjoyed. He feels he has learned inval-

able information as councillor, and is looking forward to another term as a knowledgeable public servant.

Dave Masson, another incumbent councillor, began his political career six years ago as a trustee with Eden Mills. Two years ago, he decided to go a step farther and seek election as a councillor, which he did. In his first term, Mr. Masson sat on the finance and personnel committee and the recreation committee. He was also on the steering committee for the Rockmosa Sports Complex.

John McLeod is standing for election to the Eramosa Township Council. He has lived in Rockwood for over three years, is married and has five children.

John is a professional engineer, who operates his own company, employing 20 people in Nassagaweya. He is a member and chairman of Streetsville planning board. He therefore realizes that the township area must involve thought and planning for future progress and expansion, which is inevitable.

He would attempt to provide an atmosphere of cordial communication between the township council and other governing groups and even more important with the people living in the township.

The remaining people seeking re-election were interviewed in last week's paper. These were Arthur Harris, running for reeve, Henry Holman Jr., Steven Quinlan, Gary Ritchie and Don Tomlinson, all running for seats on council.

NAMES NOT ON POLLING LIST

Any person who was qualified to have his name entered on the polling list during the period of enumeration (September 7th, 1976 to October 12th, 1976) and finds that his name is not entered thereon or who has not filed the necessary forms to have his name entered during the period for corrections to such list (ending November 5th, 1976) can attend at my office to secure a certificate which will allow his name to be entered at the polling station. In addition to this, qualified electors may be entitled to have their name added to the list at the polling station on polling day.

Qualified Elector means: a person who during the period of September 7th, 1976 to October 12th, 1976 was a Canadian citizen or other British subject, a resident of Milton or a non-resident owner or tenant or a spouse thereof and has attained the age of eighteen years by December 6th, 1976.

PROXY VOTING

Forms are available at my office for the appointment of a voting proxy. A certificate to vote by proxy must be certified by THE CLERK. This can only be done between November 16th, 1976 and 5.00 p.m. Tuesday, November 30th, 1976.

APPOINTMENT OF VOTING PROXY

Any person whose name is entered on the polling list for a polling subdivision in the municipality and who is,

- (a) A person other than one who is in a hospital or other institution, where a polling place has been provided on such premises for the purpose of polling or where provision has been made to attend upon such persons for the purpose of receiving their ballot, and
- (b) A person who is certified by a legally qualified medical practitioner, by a certificate filed with the Clerk, to be physically incapable of attending a polling place;
- (c) A person absent from his regular residence by reason of attending an educational institution and expects by reason of such absence from the municipality to be unable to vote at the advance poll or on polling day; or
- (d) A person who expects to be absent from his Polling subdivision during the election period including the advance poll and polling day by reason of his being engaged for hire or reward in the business of transportation by railway, air, water or motor vehicle,

may, on forms obtainable at the Office of the Returning Officer, 251 Main Street East, Milton, appoint any person to vote in his stead who is entitled to vote in the same municipality.

Such persons must be appointed and certified by the Clerk of the Municipality during the two week period following nomination day. (Period from November 16th, 1976 to November 30th, 1976 inclusive, but not later than 5.00 p.m. Tuesday, November 30th, 1976.
