

## Sign agreement for new complex

Everything is officially settled: There will be a community hall in Rockmosa Park, Rockwood.

Five years of discussion, work and plans ended on Friday as members of the Rockwood and District Lions' Club and Eramosa township council signed an agreement between the two groups regarding the handling of funds and the allocation of responsibility. Reeve Bill Adsett also signed a contract to have Parker Construction begin work immediately.

The complex is expected to cost about \$200,000, half of which has been received in two grants from Wintario and the Ministry of Culture and Recreation. The Lions say they have already spent almost \$50,000 for the footings and foundations plus donated labor, and equipment and have been given a \$50,000 bank loan.

The building is expected to hold 300 people for various functions and will have a modern kitchen and washrooms. Because the building is on municipal property, the township will own it. The Lion's club will hand over any money received to the council who in turn will pay the construction bills. The Lions will be overseeing the construction itself, however.

Construction is expected to start soon and be completed by spring.

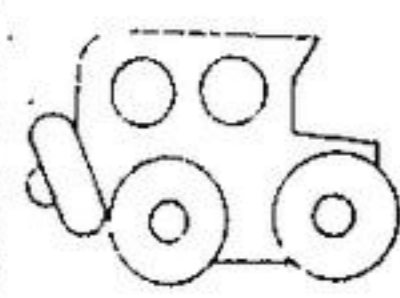
