Afterward some of the men of the church gathered to talk over the formation of a men's club.



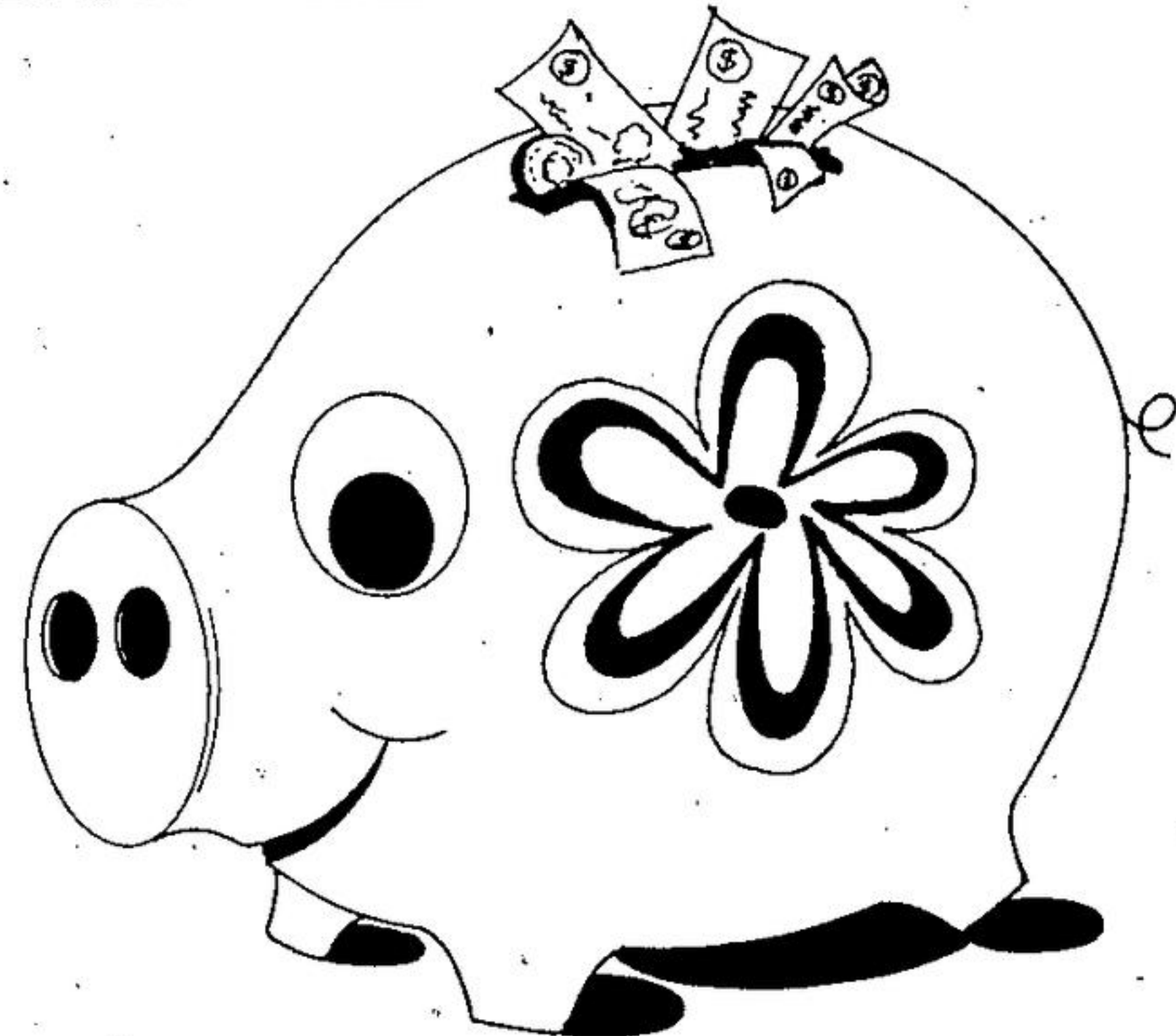
