Raps colleagues not serious

Oakville Councillor Carl Eriksen criticized colleagues on Halton Region's Administration Committee for not being concerned about proposed savings that he had urged.

Eriksen examined a budget submitted by the Regional Health Unit line by line. He proposed cuts of \$78 and as small as \$6 in one instance

during the meeting Wednesday.

In all there was about \$4,000 cut from a budget of \$1,700,545 much of which was taken from staff mileage allowances.

Annoyed Eriksen told the meeting Wednesday morning that he was annoyed by the staff practice of adding six per

cent to all budget items to come up to the ceiling imposed by the Ministry of Health and Regional Council guidelines.

Criticizing councillors for not taking his proposals seriously Eriksen asked when councillors were going to be responsible about budgeting instead of saying it isn't worth it to save \$78 or \$6 of the

taxpayers' money.

The proposed budget was presented at \$6,814 over the Ministry guidelines.

Medical Officer of Health Dr. J. H. Chamberlain suggested a self-imposed freeze on staff vacancies to make up the difference.

No freeze The Committee supported Chief Administrator Ernie Reid's contention that a freeze isn't necessary and the funds could be realized with-

out a freeze program. Among other things leaves of absence and staff turnover could help recoup the funds required to bring the budget within the guidelines.

Health Unit budgets are supposed to be into the ministry by the end of November. Budgets for mosquito spraying, Swine Flu programs and home care programs are not included in the budget but will be dealt with later.

There's a ventriloquist in the area who's put together a show that will combine music, magic and ventriloquism. He's done the whole thing himself from writing the acts to having flyers printed, to renting an auditorium.

What's unique about that? Well, Roger Zonnenberg, ventriloquist, is 13-years-old. What makes a teenager think he can accomplish such an endeavor? What is more important—what makes him succeed? In Roger's case it seems to be parents who support him but expect him to do it himself, a good self-image and a healthy sprinkling of Capricorn perseverance.

The show will be performed at the Erin public school Dec. 9 through 11. A friend and magician from Guelph, 14-year-old Lee Bonnell, will provide the hand-is-quicker-than-the-eye part of the program while a public school band will supply the music.

Roger's dummy—or partner, as he prefers to call the curly-haired charmer—plans to be as cheeky as usual.

"We do two acts," Roger said, "one is the 'traveller' where we go through a trunk Fred has brought back from a trip around the world and in the other act Fred plays a little boy and I play Santa. Fred gives Santa a hard time. I bought some baby clothes at the Salvation Army so Fred has two outfits now."

A green belt in judo and an honor student in grade nine at Erin district high school, Roger became interested in ventriloquism two years ago. Fred was a Christmas present. There were some instructions on the box as to the techniques of ventriloquism and Roger once read a book on it but he says it was mostly trial and error and practice.

"Ventriloquism means speaking from

the stomach, and it's in how you breathe and hold your tongue."

While Fred is Roger's main partner he also has a frog sock, Leroy, and a muppet-type frog, Jeremiah, which he bought in Texas last summer.

"I won a trip to Texas through the Hillsburgh Lions Club. We stayed for a month with a family and their school year starts before ours so I went to a few schools and did performances. The kids really seemed to enjoy it."

Roger and Fred entertained the Georgetown YM-YWCA summer camp which included both normal and retarded children.

"I was really amazed at the response from the retarded kids," Roger said. "They really got involved."

Are people always watching to see if his lips move?

"The kids watch Fred. The adults sometimes watch my mouth but once a man had to hold a mike for me and he was so absorbed he held it in front of Fred's mouth when Fred was speaking."

Roger's first performance was at a friend's wedding reception. "I was really nervous. Fred was shaking! But it went well and it's the only time I ever drank while Fred was talking."

Roger added it was water he was drinking.

"I'm not so nervous now. My parents gave me 100 printed business cards for my birthday last year and I put them on bulletin boards and notice boards. I've gotten a good response."

Birthday parties, Christmas parties, house parties—Roger enjoys entertaining at them all. His fee is very reasonable.

"I'm saving to invest in a more professional partner," Roger said, adding that Fred will always be first. "Fred moves his eyes and his lower lip. I'd like another partner with eyebrows that move and both lips mobile, a head that can bounce and possibly moving ears and a flipping wig. It will cost \$400-\$800. A really deluxe model can cost a couple of thousand."

Plans for the future? "I'd like to go into science in forestry for a start and work on becoming a full time ventriloquist."

Roger combed Fred's hair for a picture and almost as an afterthought ran the comb through his own.

"You're gorgeous Fred," someone commented.

Fred lowered his eyes and looked positively sheepish.

Make film

Nassagaweya 'Summer Rain'

Halton County Radial Railway, Guelph Line, was host to a crew filming a short scene for the latest Canadian movie "Summer Rain" in September.

"Summer Rain" is a \$750,000 Anglo-Canadian movie drama which the British Rank Organization and Odeon Theatres of Canada are co-producing, mainly on location north of Peterborough. Its theme is about a teacher who arrives at a Canadian boarding school in the '20s and becomes the centre of a love tug-of-war between a rich, middle-aged widow (British actress Honor Blackman) and the headmaster's daughter (Toronto actress Trudy Young).

Once on the property, the movie crew chose the curve into the station as being the spot they wanted. The reflectors and cameras were set up, the extras were loaded in the car, instructions given to the train's crew (Bob Johns, Brian Coleman and Neil McCarton), and then began more than two dozen trips from the station switch to the station. All this while keeping the regular service car spaced in between. Four hours were spent doing this short shuttle while the movie crew filmed the extras

through the window and when the car stopped, they were filmed getting up to leave the car. Several scenes were shot with actress Trudy Young standing at the car's doorway.

Near the end of the shooting, two high speed run pasts were filmed, one of which the movie crew wanted the camera only inches away from the moving car. It was during this shooting that the crew felt sure the camera man was hit. Alighting from the car and questioning him, he assured the local extras he was all right and did manage to get the shot he wanted.

To satisfy the whims of the movie crew, Trudy Young agreed to do a "Perils of Pauline" scene in which he had her arms and legs tied and was laid across the rail in front of the car half way up the line. The movie crew were busy taking stills when the regular service car came into view. This got Ms. Young a little concerned and a couple of half realistic screams were emitted before she was assured a flagman had stopped the car.

Back at the station it was found that this was the last day of shooting for this movie and many of the crew said their farewells before parting.

The movie is scheduled for release this winter.

Notice of any hearing that may be held will be given only to persons who have filed an objection or notice of support and who have left with or delivered to the Clerk Administrator undersigned, the address to which notice of hearing is to be sent.

THE LAST DATE for filing objections will be December 9th, 1976.

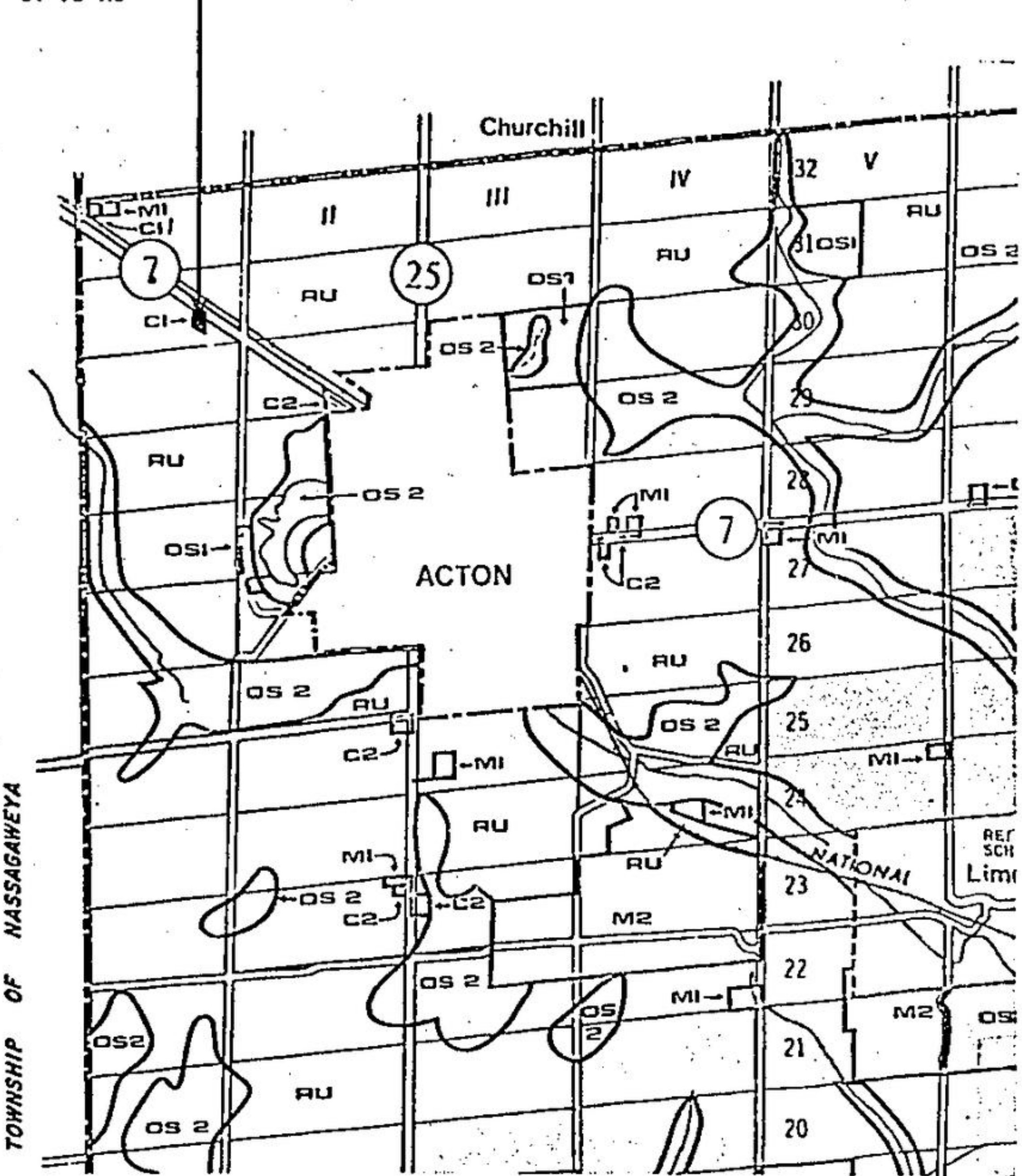

That Schedule "B" to By-law 74-51 is amended by changing the zone designation of those lands outlined on the plan attached to this By-law as Schedule "I" and being composed of part of Lot 31, Concession 1, from General Commercial (C1) to Rural (RU).

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF HALTON HILLS Amendment to by-law 74-51 by by-law 76-75 EXPLANATORY NOTE

Council for The Corporation of the Town of Halton Hills deems it advisable to amend by-law 74-51 which is a zoning by-law affecting the area formerly within the Township of Esquequing. By-law 76-75 amends by-law 74-51 by deleting from Schedule "B" of the by-law the General Commercial (C1) symbol in Lot 31, Concession 1 and replacing it with a Rural (RU) zone designation.

The lands presently designated General Commercial (C1) zone in Lot 31, Concession 1, for the Township of Esquequing as indicated on Schedule "B" to by-law 74-51 are not used for commercial purposes. The original intention in enacting by-law 74-51 was to provide for existing uses, but it appears that through an oversight the parcel of land shown as Commercial zone on Schedule "B" to by-law 74-51 in Lot 31, Concession 1 was wrongly designated.

If the property is rezoned from Commercial (C1) to Rural (RU) zone the uses which may be made of the property are set out in section 6 of by-law 74-51 and generally include agricultural and forestry uses, one single family detached dwelling on any one lot, recreational uses and professional offices.

If the property dealt with by by-law 76-75 is zoned Rural (RU) the zone designation will conform with the Official Plan in force for the former Township of Esquequing area.
