Board rejects grade 13 exams Prince Edward County Board

Thursday, the trustees sup-ported only half of Trustee Dick Goodin's motion to bring back province-wide departmental exams in Halton high schools.

Goodin said every school has different standards and many community groups and educators are joining him in calling for better standards of student evaluation.

Superintendent of Instruction John Boich said since 1969 the board has been moving towards uniform Haltonwide tests and more are being developed all the time.

Trustee Tony Goodyear said if tests have been being given all along that isn't what he has been hearing from the community.

Director of Education Em Lavender said a recent report from Ontario universities points out the number of pupils failing first year has not changed appreciably over the years. The universities say this is either because of improved university instruction or because university standards aren't as stringent

He said the same report wants the basics taught in public schools but aren't in favor of the schools going back to the old departmental exams or university entrance




