Finishing touches applied to Brampton college

Contractors are putting the finishing touches to the new Sheridan College Brampton Campus, which will open for classes January 3, 1977, at the southeast corner of Steeles Ave., West, and McLaughlin

The top three floors of the multi-level complex, includ-ing the campus' technical wing, are complete. Workers are hurrying to finish the ground floor in time for the big move this Wednesday (Dec. 8). Moving vans will transfer the library visual arts department from the existing Church St.

campus to the new campus. Everything else-technology, applied arts and business and secretarial studies-will be transported to the new facilities during the following week.

be spent setting up classrooms and studios in preparation for the beginning of lounges, classes Jan. 3.

Sheridan College vicepresident Barrie Wray said the move will go ahead as planned whether or not construction is complete.

"We are committed irrevocably to begin moving Dec. 8 and to have classes start Jon. 3," he said. "We'll be there even if we have to dodge painters and carpenters."

The move will climax three years of design and construction since the \$7.5 million first phase was approved by the Ministry of

Colleges and Universities. The new campus, located about one mile south of the existing one, is a cluster of four separate structures linked by an arterial concourse which forms the core or spine of the college.

The interior contains some courts, mezzanines, open teaching areas, technology labs, visual arts studios and general classrooms. Student services such as




