'Let's tell them'
Raftis pushes H.R.C.A. move

Burlington Councillor Jack Raftis last week continued his campaign to bring the Halton Region Conservation Authority offices into the proposed regional complex on Bronte Rd. in Oakville.

Mr. Raftis told council two weeks earlier that he felt the Milton based conservation headquarters should be moved holus-bolus into the new complex whether the Authority wanted to move or not.

Introducing the matter for the second time in two meetings Raftis said, "I'm tired of this going back and forth and in and out. Let's tell them we want it integrated and that's the end of it."

Savings Raftis claimed there would be savings and benefits for HRCOA if they joined in and took space in the proposed building.

"We all go out and say we are in favor of eliminating duplication. We can't even integrate what is a regional responsibility."

While there has been no formal debate or motion on the matter, the suggestion has support with some Burlington Councillors.

Milton Councillor Marjorie Powys accused Raftis of being insincere in his desire to have everything in one house. "If you were sincere you would have gone to Milton in the first place."

Oakville Mayor Harry Barrett said it would be irresponsible to tell the Authority that it was coming in come hell or high water.

Dec. 9 meeting He agreed with Oakville

Councillor Terry Mannell's suggestion that council do nothing until the Authority meets Dec. 9 to discuss the matter and review a special report on the subject.

Councillor Jim Watson told council he could go along with the request to have HRCOA move in as long as the same request or directive went to the Children's Aid Society and the Police Commission.

Prior to the choice of a regional headquarters' site in Oakville HRCOA officials had said the Authority would be happy to consider moving in with the region only if the site was in the Milton area.

"Erin will eventually become the doll-house capital of the world," said John Denison, 8th Line, Erin Twp., as we sat in the living room of his fascinating log house which inspired him to build his first doll house last Christmas.

Around us were doll houses, all shapes and sizes, some finished some not.

It has been a busy year for John and his family. He and his wife Jean make the houses and children Zeke, 5 and Sarah, 6, test their durability. Most of them pass, as John's objective with each house he builds for children is to make it last at least 100 child playing years. Other houses, more ornate, are made for show and are bought by adults interested in collecting miniatures.

Volunteer John's passion for building doll houses began last winter when Jean Filby, secretary at Cheltenham's Boston Mills Press, of which John is president, decided to buy her children a doll house for a Christmas present. John volunteered to make the gift and fashioned it on the pioneer-style log cabin he had recently built on his parent's 8th Line property.

The Boston Mills Press employees celebrated Christmas at Terra Cotta Inn, and it was there that John unveiled his house for Jean. "The other diners were aghast," said John, "when they saw the house and I received several orders right there."

Since then, John has landed a contract with the Mississauga based company Upper Canada Soap and Candle Makers and his houses have been sold across Canada.

Different sizes Houses similar to the one he made Jean Filby sell for up to \$500. Now he is producing others from \$25 and up depending on the size and the amount of work involved.

The ones he makes for

Upper Canada Soap and Candle Makers are strictly used to house miniature furniture, for show. They are sturdy, but will not stand up to the day-to-day habits of children. Many of them sport shingled roofs and are balconied.

Children's doll houses, however, are what John aims to produce in great numbers. "I remember, when I was a child, doll houses were very common," he said. "Then the fad for children to own one passed and even today there are very few children who own a good sized, sturdy house, where the imagination can run riot."

Money is necessary to live on," he said, "but money is not the reason I am interested in this business. I want to produce something which people will look at in a century and say 'John Denison of Erin made that.'"

When John first made his houses all parts were hand-crafted. Now he is having the fronts processed in Toronto. All the fronts will be stamped out and will look alike when they reach John's workshop.

The floors and roofs are built of half-inch birch plywood and are sturdy enough for an adult to sit on. The walls are made of hard-board.

It is at his workshop that each house will take on a different personality. They will be cut and shaped and painted, then the interior walls are erected. Jean helps with the intricate details of each house, shingling, window framing and wallpapering.

Wallpaper John and Jean have designed and will reproduce their own wallpaper. It will be made on a miniature scale and for those houses bought unfinished, the purchaser will be able to buy rolls of wallpaper to suit his taste.

"Do you know," he said, "that doll houses are the third greatest hobby in North America after stamps and

coins and I would like to say I can be a part of that hobby."

Houses do not have to be restricted to dolls, said John, as he showed a yellow triangular piece of wood with holes in it. "This is a mouse house. These are becoming popular for boys who are not usually interested in collecting dolls. Many gift shops sell miniature mice and other animals."

John has plans to market the doll houses through gift and craft shops in the area and hopes soon to open a small shop at his home.
