Reid's seat safe in Erin election

There will be two new faces on Erin township council in January.

Incumbent councillor John K. Reid was assured of two more years in office, with newcomers George Root and Mrs. J. Schneider filling the two seats left vacant by Jack Marshall and Ted Ormisher.

George Root led in the polls, taking 703 of the votes. Mr. Reid followed with 608, with Mrs. Schneider getting 570 votes. Mrs. Schneider is the first woman ever to be elected to Erin township council.

Subdivisions concern Erin township council

Erin Township has purchased a new truck, cab, wing, plow and dump box. The complete package cost \$50,391.65. Ed Barden, road superintendent, brought the report on it to Erin Township Council meeting on Wednesday night, Dec. 1.

subdivisions took up considerable time at the meeting, when Bob Long of Triton Engineering presented plans and agreements to council members.

The main problem in the Glen Devon subdivision is water consumption. It has been 40,000 gal. a day higher than it should be, leading to the belief there is a leakage in underground pipes, which probably were damaged in the process of building. Water service boxes and valves are buried, posing a problem in locating them. By throttling down the valve, Bob Cheyne figures they have saved 11,000 gallons of water a day. At present, 50,000 gallons are being used for 175 families.

proper drawings on the system should be asked for, to record what's there; water service boxes and valves be raised; leaks be repaired at developers' expense; get water mains tested, to be sure they are not leaking, and check hydrants. This is to be seen to as soon as possible.

Flooded basements Regarding the Mountainview subdivision, flooded basements are the bane of home owners. This problem exists every spring. There is 5 to 15 feet of gravelly area over the bedrock, and the water flows through the gravel to the Credit River. The water table has been high the last few years, coupled to the fact that a beaver dam · was choking up the river. Due to the fact the basements are considered too low for that particular area, there is no

easy solution. Council thought it might be fairly practical to construct a gravity sub-surface drain to keep the water table below basement level, or dig around houses and put in new drains, but it would be economically unfeasible to dig a 20 ft. wide ditch across the road, as the petition suggested. It would be a "ghastly" problem to divert the water, and would

cause untold other problems. The township decided they have no responsibility in doing this.

Questionaire received about the Armstrong subdivision, council recommended sending a Discussions on the three letter to the Minister of Housing, that the subdivision is approved by the township, but they don't have enough information to answer the questionaire. The health unit

will want some soil tests done first, and the conservation authority want the drainage done before the draft of approval. The whole subdivision will be registered, but the building will be staged over several years. The new arena being con-
