

Investigation of teacher election activities rejected

Trustee Rick Goodin's call for an investigation into teacher activity during the recent election received little support from Halton Board of Education, Thursday.

Goodin, who is retiring from the board, suggested Director of Education Em Lavender look into election activity by local teachers and also investigate "provincial federation activities to influence elections."

Trustee Ernie Bodnar said such a chore would better be

handled by the provincial trustee's association while Trustee Bill Lawson said investigating teacher political activity certainly wasn't Lavender's job.

At one point during the meeting defeated Trustee Tony Goodyear observed there had been considerable teacher activity during the election.

Goodin's call for an investigation was rejected by the board.

Rural hydro rates go up

Rates to the 750,000 customers served directly by Ontario Hydro's rural system will be increased Jan. 1, 1977, it was announced today. The rate change will increase Hydro revenues from these customers by an average of 25.6 per cent.

The effect of the increase on individual customers will vary, depending on their consumption and customer classification such as residential, farm or cottage.

For example, a typical farm customer's monthly bill of \$38 will increase approximately \$8.65. A typical residential customer's monthly bill of \$28 in a low density area will increase by \$7.33.

Details of the rate increase, which conform to the intent of the Federal anti-inflation guidelines, are now being mailed to rural customers. In 1975, retail system revenues fell short of costs by

\$4.9 million. The deficit forecast for this year is \$10.9 million.

All bills issued after Jan. 1 will be pro-rated. The 1976 rates will apply from the last meter reading this year to Dec. 31. Thereafter the newly-announced 1977 rates will apply.

The rate increase reflects spiralling cost pressures upon Hydro in providing service. Ontario Hydro's total fuel bill for instance, including rising prices for coal, oil, natural gas and uranium, is expected to increase by 31 per cent in 1977.

The Ontario Energy Board held hearings on Ontario Hydro's 1977 rates which included a detailed examination of all elements of bulk power costs and recommended an increase in bulk power rates of 30.3 per cent to all wholesale customers, including the rural system.

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Committee set to study remedials

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF MILTON

BY-LAW NO. 68-76

A By-law to amend former Township of Nassagaweya By-law Number 11-67 entitled "The Zoning By-law for the Township of Nassagaweya", being a Restricted Area By-law of the Town of Milton.

WHEREAS the Municipal Council of The Corporation of The Town of Milton deems it expedient to amend By-law Number 11-67, being the Restricted Area Zoning By-law for the Nassagaweya Planning Area.

NOW THEREFORE the Municipal Council of The Corporation of The Town of Milton enacts as follows:

- That Section 6.A.1.2.1 of By-law Number 11-67 is hereby amended by deleting therefrom, in its entirety, subsection 6 and substituting therefor the following new subsection 6:
6.A.1.2.1.6 FLOOR AREA
Minimum in RR Zones

1 Storey	1,400 square feet
1 1/2 Storey	1,500 square feet
2 Storeys	1,800 square feet
Split Level	1,450 square feet

- This By-law shall become effective on the date hereof subject to receiving the approval of the Ontario Municipal Board.

THE CORPORATION OF THE TOWN OF MILTON

BY-LAW NO. 68-76

EXPLANATORY NOTE

This By-law will amend the existing Restricted Area By-law of the former Township of Nassagaweya, being the Zoning By-law of the Town of Milton, By-law No. 11-67, as amended.

By-law 11-67 presently provides that the minimum floor area in a Rural Residential "RR" Zone is 2,000 square feet.

By-law 68-76 proposes to amend By-law No. 11-67 so that the floor area minimum in Rural Residential "RR" Zones will be as follows:

1 Storey	1,400 square feet
1 1/2 Storey	1,500 square feet
2 Storeys	1,800 square feet
Split Level	1,450 square feet
