The McLean chickens have always won many prizes but mostly at the CNE. The Ducks go to the Royal.

At one time, Mr Metean crossed Cayugas with Rouens for a fine eating duck He claims they were dehenous but Mrs-McLean says "there's not much to cat on a duck, they're all feathers."

Lately he hasn't been able to prepare any of his own ducks for table - other people are always after his ducks for breeding stock. He hardly gets to eat any eggs either; they're too much in demand for producing more championship ducks.


