A 25-minute delay in the starting of the Orangeville game dulled major peewees until late in the middle frame when Brad Manes tallied with an unassisted effort.

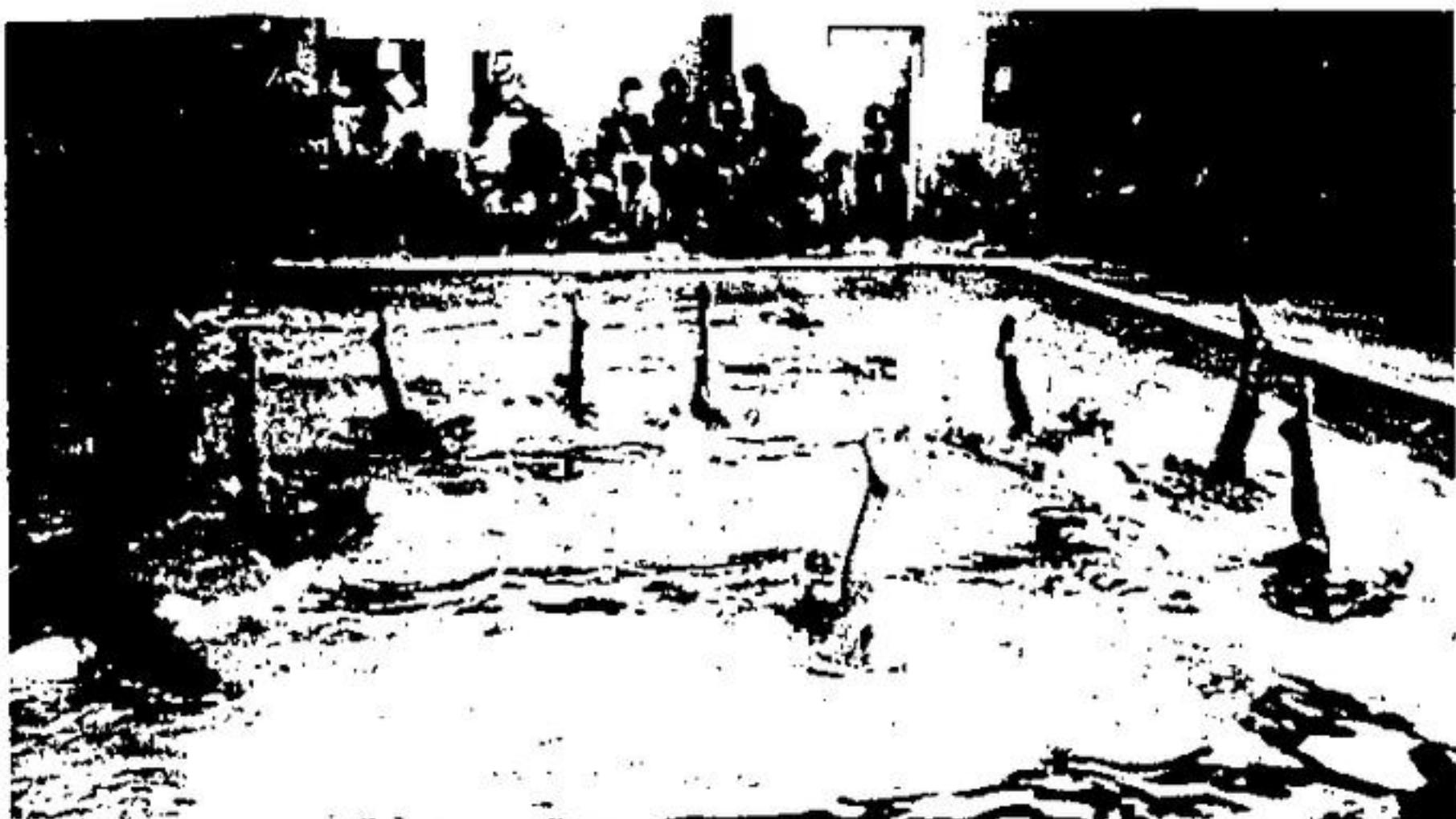
Four goals Neil Cameron scored four times for Orangeville. Fergus' tactic of pulling the
