Five trucks to fight \$10,000 blaze

Fire fighters from Acton and Milton joined forces to combat an approximately \$10,000 blaze in the upper storey of Marilyn Ottaway's home on 25 Sideroad near the

6th Line Monday night. Acton sent two trucks and stayed until after Milton's three vehicles arrived to take over the task. Milton stayed about three hours and Acton for about two. The fire was reported about 7:20 p.m.

Mrs. Ottaway was alone at home at the time, and was taken to Guelph General Hospital, but Milton OPP said she was not taken to Guelph as a result of the fire.

Fire chief Mick Holmes said that Mrs. Ottaway had been sick and that her brother and sister came to the house to see how she was when they noticed the fire.

The fire is believed to have started in a bedroom and heat and smoke quickly spread through the upper floor of the farmhouse.

Milton fire chief A. E. Clement said that the fire is still under investigation, and that no definite cause for the blaze has been pinned down. Fire chief Holmes said that there was smoke damage

Christmas Day crash sends four to hospital

A two-car collision on Christmas Day at the intersection of Highways 24 and 25 resulted in four people being sent to hospital for cuts and bruises, Guelph Ontario Provincial Police report.

Vehicles driven by Hendrick Jansen, R. R. 4, Rockwood and Joost Drost, R. R. 2, Staffa sustained an estimated Sanding \$2700 in total damages. Passengers in both cars. Zwaanttie Jansen and Sini Drost and the drivers were taken to Guelph General Hospital, where they were treated and released.

The incident occurred at 11.30 a.m.

Mr. and Mrs. Jansen are the parents of Hendrick Jansen, the 23-year-old who was killed November 13 on Highway 25 just south of Hillsburgh in a two car crash which claimed two lives.

Special meeting

Region will choose new chairman by secret ballot

Halton Regional Council members will cast secret ballots to choose a chairman for the new term, when the 1977-78 council meets at a special meeting next Tuesday, Jan. 4

at 4 p.m. The idea is that council will debate the election of a chairman along with the terms of reference for the job, the pay, the expense allowance and the provision of a car.

At that meeting all of the people interested in holding the position for the two year term will make presentations to council and answer questions from the floor.

This is the first time the regional council has had to choose a chairman. Current chairman Allan Masson was appointed by the provincial government for the first three year term of Halton Region. Division

Prior to that the choosing of a warden under the old county system of government was often a controversial matter. The election of a chairman has the potential of causing a lot of division and antagonism within the coun-

cil itself. It was with that in mind that councillors agreed to a

Clerk Garfield Brown told the council that secret ballot or no secret ballot, he was required by law to call for an open stand-up vote at the inaugural meeting of council Wednesday, Jan. 12.

"I have to call on you to openly declare your vote at the inaugural meeting. What the boys in the backroom declare or don't declare is of no concern to me," he said.

Councillor Morrow argued that councillors who did not support the winner could be subjected to two years of misery because they did not want him.
