## 13 night school courses cut due to low enrolment, cold

Though more than 60 people signed up for night school courses, only three will be held for sure in the winter season.

Courses in First Aid and typing will be held, according to night school administrator Boris Shean. "Yoga will also go, as far as I know", instructor Melanjia Bray confirmed Tuesday. The typing course is the continuation of one started earlier.

Several people turned up Monday night for courses which had to be cancelled be-

cause of low registration, Mr. Shean said. Had we known at registration that that many were interested, we may have been able to save some of the courses, he said.

Next time Mr. Shean said that he was sorry that people were inconvenienced Monday, but asks that next time, if people are interested in courses but can't attend registration, they indicate their intentions with a phone call.

The 13 remaining courses, including French, general

sewing, macrame, landscaping, fitness and recreation, are dropped, he said.

Some courses may be offered in April.

Cheques used by registrants last Wednesday are already in the mail, Mr. Shean said. The Board of Education will mail cheques for registrants who used cash to cover the cost of courses.

Cold weather Mr. Shean said that the cold weather was probably a deterrent to people who would

otherwise have joined the evening classes.

The weather, which a week ago Monday closed all public

schools in north Halton, also delayed distribution of the night school's flyers. The notices were to be sent home with school children as a reminder to parents of registration.

## New phone directories to be delivered soon

Distribution of some 215,864 copies of the 1977 telephone directory for the regional municipality of Waterloo-Guelph and surrounding territory will begin on January 19. This district includes Acton. Delivery of the books by Directory Distributing Associates will be on a staggered basis throughout the area, and, barring bad weather, should be completed by February 3. This manual delivery project will employ about 350 local people who work on a contract basis.

to 3,635 delivered last year. One each One book will be delivered to each residence customer. A customer who wishes additional copies, up to the number of telephone sets in the home, may request them at the time of delivery. There will not be a charge for the extra books. This does not apply to business customers.

The front and back covers of the new book are comprised of tiny pictures of scenery and historical places in Ontario. Bound into each directory is an eightpage multi-coloured catalogue displaying the residence product

line and selected business products. The catalogue has been developed to promote product awareness to Bell customers.

District Manager P. W. Whitaker stressed that upon receipt of the new directory, the first thing to do is to write in the emergency numbers in the spaces provided on the inside front cover of the book and make necessary changes to your frequently called telephone number list. This will help to avoid unnecessary calls to Directory Assistance, he says.

Acton customers will receive 3,931 books compared

## Ted Tyler reaches 25 years of service

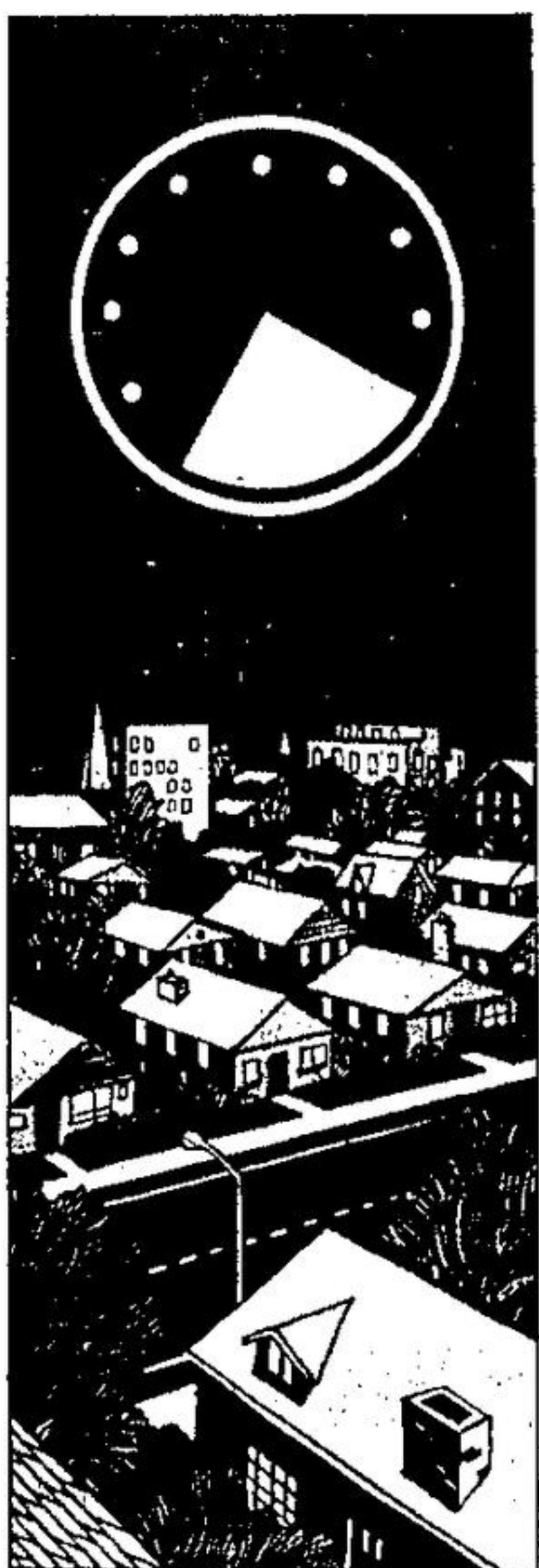
