In accordance with By-Law 74-45 and its amendments every owner of a Dog on or before the 15th day of February of each year, or within 7 days of becoming the owner of a dog after the 15th day of February, shall register each dog with the collector and apply to him for a licence and tag for each dog.

Every person who fails to comply with Section 2 or Section 7 of this By-Law is guilty of an offence and upon conviction is liable to a fine of not more than Fifty (\$50.00) Dollars exclusive of costs, and every such fine shall be recoverable under the provisions of the Summary Convictions Act, R.S.O. 1970.
