## Alex Mann was active in church

A well-known and active Acton resident, Alex W.K. Mann died on January 3 in St. Joseph's continuing care hospital. He was 86 years of age.

Mr. Mann was born on the Mann brothers farm at R. R. 2, Acton, on Christmas Day, in 1890. He was the son of John Mann and Ellen Lawson. He attended Bannockburn school and later Guelph Business College.

He married the former Lena Buck November 1, 1930, in Owen Sound.

Moved to town

They lived on the family farm until 1932 when they moved to Acton, and Mr. Mann commenced work at Beardmore and Co. in 1933. He was an employee there for the next 33 years.

The Manns' home is at 251 Arthur St. There are two children, Kenneth of Oshawa and Lynda (Mrs. Robert Paul) of Acton.

Mr. Mann was always fond of music and played many years with Acton Citizens' Band. He was a cornet soloist at one time. He also enjoyed

singing and took part in male quartettes. He also played with Knox Sunday School orchestra years ago.

He was an elder of Knox Presbyterian church since 1925 and was active in all phases of church work during his lifetime.

In recent years he was a member of the Golden Age Club.

Funeral service was held at Shoemaker Funeral Home January 5, with the Rev. A. H. McKenzie officiating. Interment was at Fairview cemetery.

## Morrow suggests salary for chairman

Regional Chairman Ric Morrow will recommend he receive \$25,000 a year for the job to which he plans to devote three days a week.

His \$25,000 suggestion will be examined this week by administration committee of regional council and likely considered next month.

"It would appear that a figure of \$25,000 would be an appropriate salary for the position of regional chairman, based on comparative studies," Morrow says.

He noted if his suggestion is accepted he will receive about \$11,000 less than former chairman Allan Masson received.

He also thinks regional councillors may wish to review their own pay.

"The present remuneration of \$8,500 has been in effect for three years. I believe council should adopt a policy which would amend the salary to reflect existing conditions," he reports.

Morrow suggests cost of living increases and Anti-inflation Board wage guidelines or use a percent-

age increase of regional department heads pay hikes as a yardstick.

In addition, Morrow thinks council should consider giving regional committee chairmen a bonus of \$1,500 to \$2,000 a year.

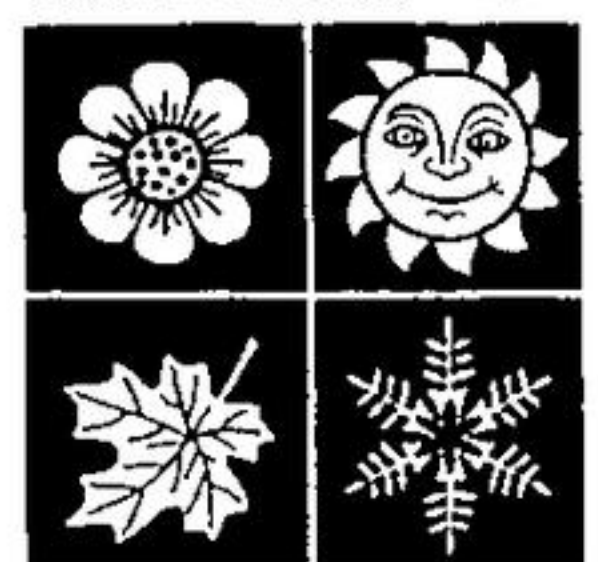
The objective in Halton Hills is \$28,000.
