CHICAGO TRIBUNE RECENTLY published this chart on how to establish the wind chill factor. If the temperature is 0 degrees Fahrenheit, and the wind blowing at ten miles an hour, the wind chill would be minus 21 degrees. C. G. Lions present council with operating requests

There will be a six person community centre committee to oversee the new complex in Rockwood Park, Rockwood. This was one of the few of several points that the Eramosa township council agreed upon when the Rockwood Lions and Lionettes made a presentation to the council at Monday evening's meeting.

The delegation's lawyer, Jerry Matthews said the group proposed Lions Harry Bonner, by virtue of a deed, Herb Saunders, Gary Ritchie, Lionette Leona Kingsbury, and two members of council, to sit on the committee. Council discussed the proposal at great length, and even though the Lion's members outweighed the council members, they thought everyone named was responsible and a hard worker.

Expensive equipment The Lionettes also requested total use of the kitchen facilities, at least until the bank loan of \$50,000 was paid off. Lionette Barb Bonner explained this was because of the expensive equipment installed. She explained that anyone having another group enter an affair could only serve cold plates, and they were welcome to use the refrigerator only. Even with this, one Lionette must be present.

The council felt this request was fair.

Exclusive Lions use of the bar was also asked for. Mr. Matthews explained that the group wanted the right to all bar receipts, except in the case of a fund-raising affair, where the receipts would be donated back to the cause.

The Lions also asked that only a member of their organization be able to tend bar. They cited the use of expensive equipment again as their reason for this. This too would only be in effect until the bank loan was paid off.

Councillor Dave Masson felt that the bar equipment

was not that expensive for it to be handled this way, but decided the bar profits would be going back into the community anyway, and agreed to let this point stand.

Rental fees The fourth stated that the Lions and ionettes would get all the hall rental fee, until the loan is paid. Council felt this was unfair, as the municipality was responsible for the maintenance and operating costs. It was suggested by council that the council receive the rental fees, to help pay for these costs. Councillor John McLeod said this was reasonable considering the Lions were getting the bar receipts, kitchen receipts, and free use of the hall for themselves.

The organization also requested that they be allowed to use the hall free of charge, involving dinner meetings twice monthly. Council thought this was in order, but to keep the books straight, the Lions would be charged, and when they paid their bill, the council would return the money to them.

The points also asked that the Lions lawyer be able to look over the board's constitution. Council did not feel this was necessary, as the board is an operating group which would make up the constitution themselves, thus needing no solicitor's advice.

Pay Another point made up by the Lions concerned the paid members of council. The Lions felt if the councillors attending the meeting were to be paid, the other members should be. The council decided to leave this matter up to the committee itself. Mr. Adsett pointed out, however, that if pay was to be received, it would have to come out of that committee's operating budget.

Council decided the committee would also be in charge of electing their own chairman, deciding who was going to be responsible for the bookings, etc.

Concerned parents say no go for Fergus high

Concerned parents have banded together in a fight to keep their high school student children in Guelph schools rather than have them bussed to Fergus.

Dr. Kenneth MacKay, Harvey McDougall and Peter Southwell attended Eramosa township council Monday evening to ask the members to endorse a petition to keep the students in Guelph. A proposal had been made, the men said, by someone in the Wellington County Board of Education administration to take students to Fergus high school.

The men were concerned about the quality of education, the bussing time, and the possibility that the students will be moved from Fergus back to Guelph in another year. Students needing special attention would still have to go to a Guelph school, which would mean they would have to take the bus to Fergus and then to Guelph, they said.

Mr. Southwell told the council the Board of Education members first found out about this proposal the other day and are looking into the matter.

Meeting The men pointed out that more than 100 concerned parents had gathered at Eramosa public school to discuss the matter, at which time the petition was drawn up. They asked council if one member could come to a meeting this Monday evening when the parents will be meeting with the Wellington County Board of Education in Guelph.

Deputy Reeve Henry Holman Jr. said he would like to attend because he is from the area affected, and has youngsters who will soon be in high school. Councillor Alan Bur-
