## Acclaim Reed candidate

At a no-surprise nomination meeting February 1, Julian Reed was acclaimed Liberal candidate for Halton-Burlington provincial riding, by 110 Liberals at the Newfoundland Club, Norval.



Reed said it was the second time he had been acclaimed, and the second time he had been nominated by Hugh McFarlane, President of the Norval Community Association. He described his first 17 months as "on the job training", before stating the two important local issues still unresolved are garbage and the hydro corridor. He emphasized location of

land fill sites is not the real concern rather a permanent solution for garbage disposal, particularly in areas with growing population and subsequent pollution, is the ultimate goal.

He said he had been consistent in this view, "We have to stop putting holes in the ground, and instead turn waste into assets. He pointed out the technology has been known for 40 years and has been used in Europe for a long time. He said he would continue to work for solid waste recovery and the use of garbage to produce energy.

Reed promised to continue his fight for an independent study on the Hydro corridor from Bradley to Limehouse. He said the Ministry of Environment has had the opportunity since 1973 to allow a study. "It's nothing new, nor is it irrational, it has been done on four previous occasions in other areas, but it has not yet been done here."

He pointed out the delays, claimed to be costing a million dollars a day, were the responsibility of the M.O.E. who had stalled on the study. He said the education issue had been implemented, but pointed out the Conservative government policy had originated with the Liberal party. "It takes imitation to improve a situation that's fine."

He commented Darcy McKeough had managed to pile up a huge deficit. "Robards didn't have a deficit, Frost didn't have a deficit, and I don't think George Drew had a deficit, but that was before my time."

He said affordable housing

was another major issue, and pointed out a house is the only stake many people have in society.

He termed the tax reform proposals a "thorny issue" and claimed private schools, YMCA buildings, scout and guide buildings would be taxed. He explained a rebate could be sought, but pointed out that put the government in position of judge of the worth of an organization.

He said the government wants to remove the right of farmers to pay their taxes, and instead charge taxes against the farm at eight per cent for 10 years. The lien would be claimed when the land sold and went out of agriculture. "In the minds of many people if the government is paying the taxes the land is no longer freehold—and they call themselves a conservative government."

He concluded by reminding the group a candidate doesn't get elected alone, and needs many people to help him.

## Liberal leader hits out at Tories

"No one knows better than I, than I made mistakes in the first few months," Dr. Stuart Smith, Ontario Liberal Leader admitted, February 1, at the Halton-Burlington Provincial Liberal Association meeting in Norval.

He said since then the caucus has learned to pull together. He stated the Liberals used to be accused of not standing for anything, but simply being against the government. He cited a 25 page detailed program on education with curriculum planning as an example of initiative.

## Liberal leader praises Reed

Dr. Stuart Smith, Ontario Liberal Leader, had glowing words of praise for M. P. Julian Reed, at Halton-Burlington Provincial Liberal nomination meeting, February 1, at the Newfoundland Club, Norval. Reed was acclaimed Liberal candidate at the meeting.

He said he was outstanding member of caucus, and in fighting for others. Smith said Julian Reed has the capacity to look to the future, especially in matters of energy and garbage disposal. "He cares for the next generation and cares for conserving our resources for our children."

Smith said the Halton-Burlington member had gone to the Ministry of Environment several times about the hydro corridor, and has been involved with the garbage dump site discussions with the region. He said Reed's tremendous interest in the problem of anyone in his riding has been impressive.

He termed the original Conservative proposal of three to four million dollars under the Farm Income Bill a drop in the bucket. We sent it back and it has come back 10 to 20 times that.

"Can you imagine a government standing back and allowing greyhound to take over the only two profitable runs of Gray Coach and giving, not selling, the Sudbury and Buffalo runs to an American owned company?" Smith asked. He pointed out Gray Coach belongs to the people through the Toronto Transit Commission. He said Gray Coach has been running to small communities at a loss with only these two routes making money.

He emphasized it was the Liberal party who raised the question repeatedly. He said he hoped they had saved Gray Coach, but said they had at least forced another hearing before the Ontario Highway Transport Board.

He pointed out Eddie Goodman, whom he termed "Davis' travelling companion," is the lawyer for Greyhound Lines.

Hitting out again at the Conservative government, the liberal leader said the mess of different rates paid group homes called for attention. He said some homes are paid \$30 a day per person and some paid \$85, for no apparent reasons. He said he had checked and there was no difference in service.

He said the government had the report for 20 months, before at his insistence it was finally revealed the afternoon before Christmas when the house recessed. He concluded by charging the Conservatives with stealing the Liberal platform plank by plank.

## Grant for valley land

An Ontario grant of \$160,000 for valley land acquisition by the Grant River Conservation Authority has been approved. The Authority plans to acquire an additional 116 acres with buildings from the Ontario Waterfowl Research Foundation, bringing to 547 the number of acres involved in the enlargement of Han-

lon's Creek Conservation Area. The Grand River Conservation Authority has gradually acquired valley lands along Hanlon's Creek for a number of years. The proposed land acquisition of 116 acres is within the City of Guelph. Total cost is estimated at \$320,000.

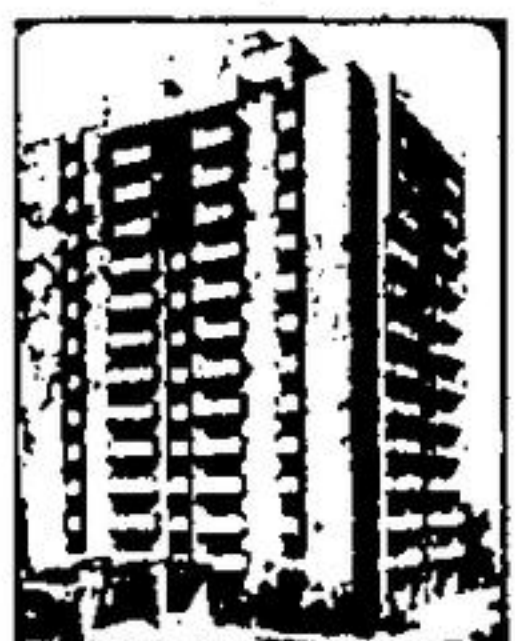
